## Legion and Oil Firm Plan Huge Fireworks Display July 4

Brilliant new set pieces and aerial bombardments, many being exhibited for the first time, will be seen in Salem during the pyrotechnic display sponsored by the Shell Oil company, as a feature of the American Legion's 4th of July celebration at the Oregon State fairgrounds, it was announced Friday.

The elaborate display is titled "Grand Salute to America" and is loaded with color and novelty from start to finish. "Over five months have been devoted to the planning of this new, super presentation," according to the oil company's manager, J. C. Emlen. "Of particular interest will be the gigantic Statue of Liberty set. Magnificently designed, this inspiring figure, surmounted by a huge blazing torch, will close the show. The opening salvo, exploding at a great altitude with vivid flashes and terrific reports, may be seen and heard for a distance of 75 miles," Emlen said.

The spectacle is set for 9:15 p.m. in front of the fairgrounds' grandstand.

## Teachers May Be Deferred

Oregon local boards were urged Friday by Lt. Colonel Elmer V. Wooton, state director of selective service, to give serious consideration to deferment of registrants who are employed in the instruction of students being trained for professions and trades considered essential to the national defense program.

Registrants eligible for deferment in this connection might include such persons as professors in medical schools and instructors in the schools turning out airplane mechanics and other technicians. There will be no blanket deferment of such individuals, however, each case being decided on its individual merits, Colonel Wooton states.

## Medics Select Portland for Next Parley

SPOKANE, June 27—(P)—The Pacific Northwest Medical association announced Friday it would meet next year in Portland and prepared to approve officers Saturday before concluding the 1941 convention.

Dr. Matthew Riddle, named president-elect last year, will take office automatically, succeeding Dr. Donald Palmer of Spokane. The board of councilors will present its choice of president-elect and other officers for council approval.

## McNary Told Plans for Eugene Cantonment Remain the Same

WASHINGTON, June 27—(P)—Senator McNary (R-Ore.) was advised by the war department Friday that it had received no recommendation from the ninth corps area that Eugene's proposed army cantonment be shifted to a point near Corvallis.

The department said Eugene had been tentatively selected several weeks ago for a base should the army expand and congress appropriate funds. Work on the Eugene airport will continue, officials added.

Meantime, the ninth zone construction quartermaster, San Francisco, announced that surveys for a possible \$22,500,000 army camp in the Rogue river valley near Medford were underway.

camp of new streamlined triangular divisions. This would mean another big army post in west coast defenses midway between Fort Lewis, Wash., and Fort Ord, Calif., the two largest army developments on the Pacific slope.

A cost-plus contract for investigation and surveys of the general camp was awarded May 21 and \$153,000 earmarked to finance preliminary work.

Investigators must design a general camp layout, study problems of engineering, water supply, transportation, utilities, sewage disposal, roads and other basic necessities and complete the work by August 21.

Whether and when the camp will be built awaits completion of the survey and preliminary plans and the war department's decision.

Ninth corps area officers said they knew nothing of a move to shift the Eugene camp, which they said was in the status of Medford's.

Jay Burnett, who was met by a Marion county deputy sheriff a week ago as he walked out of the penitentiary, was released from forgery charges here Friday when the case against him in Salem justice court was dropped. Absence from the state of the private prosecutor was given as reason for the dismissal.

Burnett remained in the county jail Friday night awaiting officers from Benton county who will take him to Corvallis to face charges there.

## Direct Relief Load of State Shows Decrease

PORTLAND, June 27—(P)—Oregon's direct relief load in May was \$688,990, a drop of 8.4 per cent from the month before and 15 per cent from May, 1940, the state public welfare commission reported Friday.

Administrator Elmer Goudy said, however, that the total assistance program, held up by the rising cost of old age assistance, declined only 1.1 per cent from April and was 7 of one per cent higher than a year ago.

A graduated scale proposed by the surplus marketing administration for issuance of food stamps was approved by the board. It provides that relief clients in lower income brackets shall receive proportionate more blue stamps, good for surplus foods, than WPA workers in higher wage groups.

The administration also is considering shifting emphasis from surplus foods to those with needed nutritional values, Chairman Jack Luhn said. Expanding army camps have made the surplus problem less acute, he explained. Dr. B. O. Wood, Portland, was appointed part-time medical director, replacing Dr. Neil Black, who resigned last December. Clyde Getz was named director of child welfare services.

## Daughter of Pioneer Dies At Portland

PORTLAND, June 27—(P)—Mrs. Florence E. Klippel, 75, daughter of Oregon pioneers, died here Thursday night.

She was born near Corvallis, the daughter of James and Elizabeth Currier Foster who crossed the plains in 1845 and 1846, respectively, the latter claiming the distinction of being the first white woman through the Cow Creek canyon route into Oregon.

The family moved to Lake county in the 1860s where her father was a pioneer rancher and owned Oregon's most famous early-day race stable, including Oregon Eclipse, whose track records still survive in many cities west of the Mississippi.

In 1900 she was married to the late Lannes Klippel, Summer Lake and The Dalles sheepman whose father, Henry Klippel, an early Jacksonville resident and Jackson county official for many years, was one of the committee of five men who handled construction of the Oregon capital in 1873 — the building which burned in 1935.

Survivors include her son, Carl F. Klippel, Oregon City, and two sisters, Mrs. Dolph Schminck, Lakeview, and Mrs. Joseph Walters, Sonoma, Calif.
