

Final Approval Given Big Bill

Congress Sends FDR Gigantic Measure; Other Actions

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Losing no time, the senate also approved a bill prolonging the life of the Community Credit corporation for two years and increasing its crop loan funds by \$1,250,000,000 to a total of \$2,650,000,000. This measure went back to the house for action on senate amendments.

The senate passed, as a defense measure, a house bill to give the maritime commission control over movements and cargoes of all American ships. It goes to conference for the consideration of senate amendments.

In the debate which preceded the action, Chairman George (D-Ga.) warned against granting too extensive power to the administration and asserted it was not necessary to adopt "totalitarian methods" to provide national defense. Some, he said, feared that important decisions might be made before the people have an opportunity to make their views known.

Caught in a jam of disagreement was a \$935,905,000 bill to finance federal relief through the next fiscal year. Senate and house conferees met and ended their session at loggerheads over a \$50,000,000 item for the disposal of surplus commodities which the senate had inserted in the bill.

Mr. Roosevelt's power to devalue the dollar was granted originally over intensive republican opposition. In 1934, it authorized him to cut the gold in the dollar to 59 per cent of its former weight.

In 1936 and 1938 the power to chop the remaining nine per cent from the original value of the dollar was continued for two year period, always after a spirited battle with republicans and one faction of the democratic party.

Senator Glass (D-Va.) formerly an opponent of the legislation, backed it vigorously this time as necessary to give the administration power to deal with any repercussions from the foreign crisis.

WASHINGTON, June 28-(P)—In a sharply critical report on defense progress, the house military committee asserted Saturday that a series of major "failures" and "delays" had led to a present serious lack of strategic materials.

The deficiencies, the committee added in a voluminous report based on weeks of study, were attributable largely to "absence of a responsible head with authority and power," but also to national pre-occupation in recent years with "social reform rather than national security."

The report spoke, too, of a need for "vision" on the part of government officials and observed: "The administration has been too prone when difficult problems arose to easily dispose of them by creating another board, only to add to the confusion of the assortment of agencies we now have."

As for the lack of strategic materials, the report said: "A shortage of aluminum is 'critical' because of inadequate power and fabrication facilities. Rubber is not available in sufficient quantities primarily because of a lack of ships and refusal by some shippers to carry the commodity."

Noted Salem Artist Prepares for One-Man Exhibit at Art Center

Home from an expedition into the art world of the eastern seaboard and Mexico, Byron Randall, Salem artist, is preparing for his second one-man exhibition at the Art Center here. The exhibit will open July 7 and will continue two weeks.

In the two years Randall was away from Salem, he won acclaim from numerous critics and collectors. One Hollywood producer who has an extensive collection of watercolors, purchased 20 of Randall's paintings. The famous Duncan Phillips collection in Washington, DC, purchased one. The Baltimore Museum of Art and the Museum of Modern Art in New York City each hung a jury-selected painting of his.

Such national magazines as *Newsweek* and *Art* have devoted feature articles to Randall and reproduced his work, as have also the art pages of the larger newspapers of the East.

Further recognition of Randall's paintings is indicated in the number of galleries and museums that

have given him one-man exhibitions. Among them are the Whyte Gallery in Washington, DC, Henderson Galleries in Los Angeles, Courvoisier Gallery in San Francisco, Seattle Museum of Art, the Butte Museum, and Reed College.

Randall is the son of Mr. and Mrs. K. L. Randall of Salem. He came here at the age of two, with his parents. He graduated from Salem high school in 1937. On January 1, 1939, he had the first exhibit of his career at the Salem Federal Art Center.

In April of that year, armed with a portfolio of Salem watercolors and high hopes of making his work pay him a living while he continued to develop as a creative artist, he left for the east.

Success was not long in coming. With his first visit to a gallery in Washington, Randall interested Donald Whyte in his paintings. Whyte immediately bought 33 of them and took an option on future work. During a subsequent trip to Hollywood, Whyte sold 20 of the paintings.

Irish Leader Gives Pledge For Defense

ENNIS, Eire, June 28-(P)—Prime Minister Eamon de Valera pledged Eire Saturday to "defend ourselves against attack no matter from what quarter it comes."

"And that," he added in a speech here, "is our duty from the point of view of neutrality. 'Every day sees the country more and more in a position of danger,' he said, urging the nation to 'think and plan calmly' against eventualities while it had time.

British Ask Daring War

LONDON, June 28-(P)—Agitation grew in Britain Saturday night for daring attacks by army

and navy raiders on the German-held continental coasts, now that the nazis' backs are turned, and one general suggested that amphibian tanks join them in a general offensive teamed up with the army, continuing RAF aerial assaults.

General J. F. C. Fuller, one of the first British generals to exploit the use of tanks in the World war, called in the "Sunday pictorial" for "tip and run" raids by the army and navy on "the coasts of countries now occupied by Germany." Strong German forces would have to be diverted to protect these coasts, he declared.

Solicitation of funds needed by the Boys' and Girls' aid society of Oregon is going forward at top speed in Oregon. Dr. P. O. Riley, county campaign chairman, reports. In a state-wide drive, the society is seeking contributions to meet present needs which total \$5000.

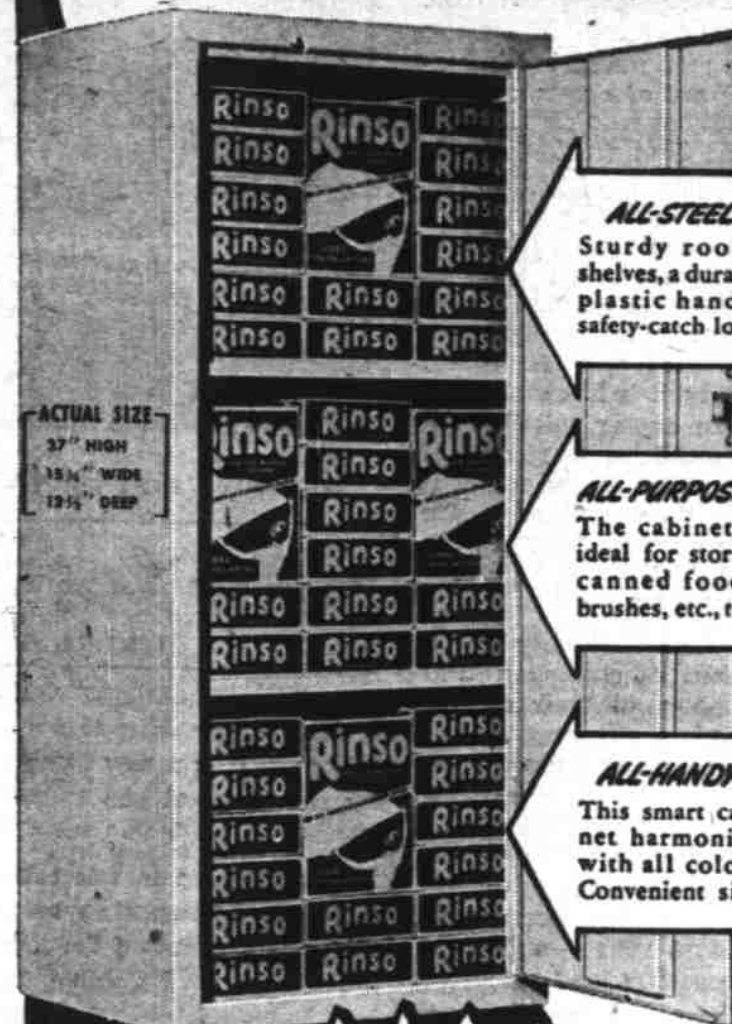
Walks to California

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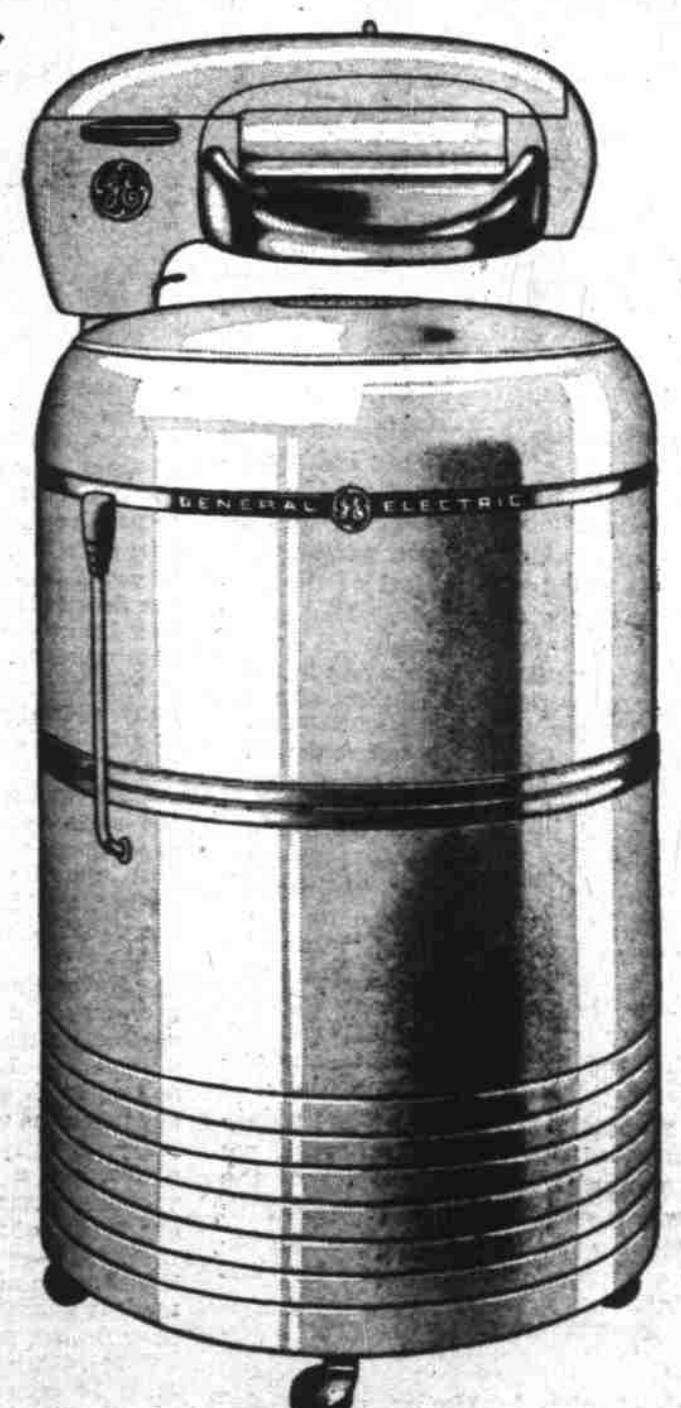
