Building permits in Salem showed an upward trend the past week with a total of \$33,627 set aside for construction purposes within the city limits.

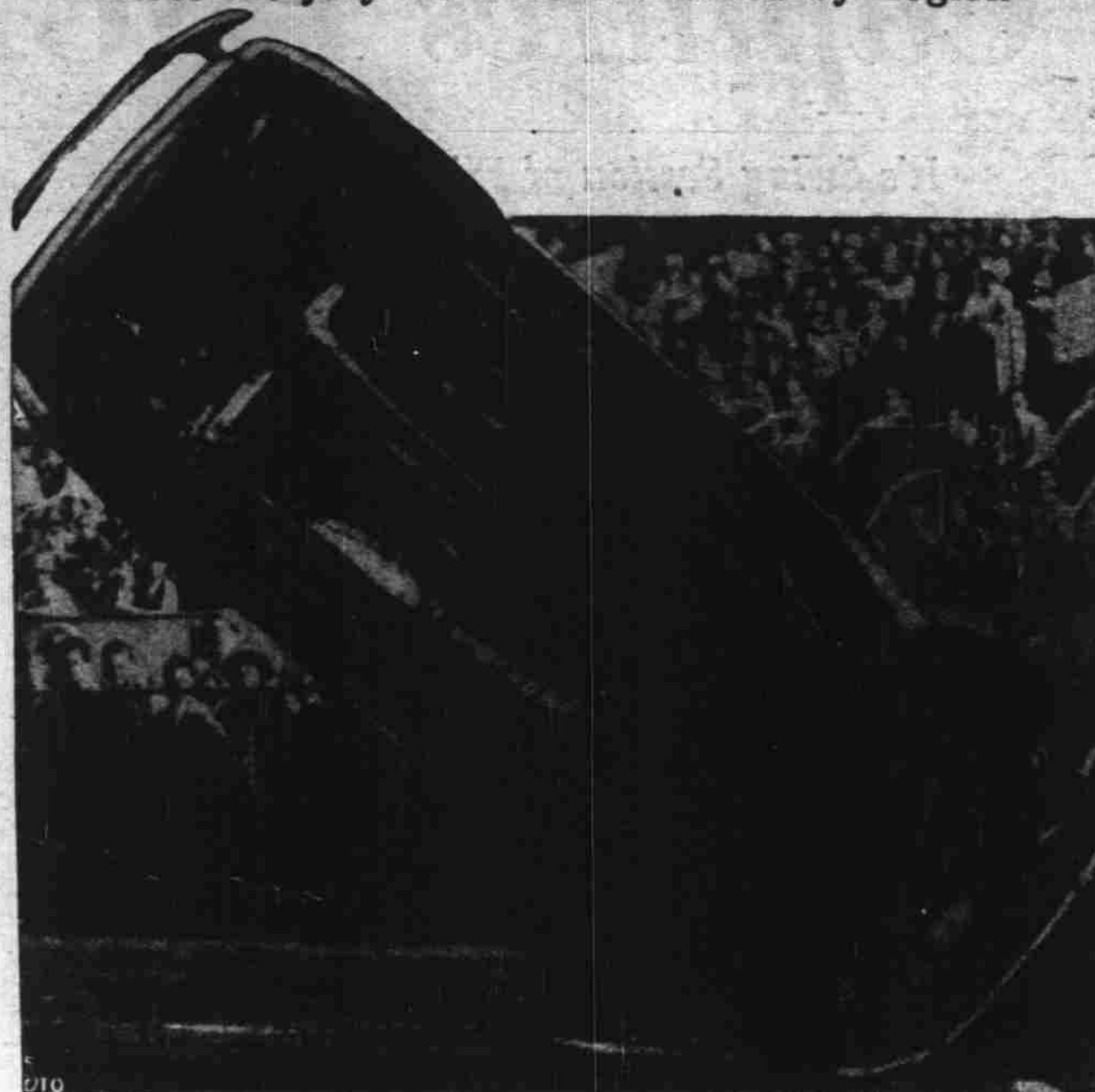
Largest permit was that for store in the downtown business area at a cost of \$18,000.
