Service Men

The 668 Oregon men involved in the 19th selective service call will begin reporting at the Portland induction station on October 7, military headquarters here announced Friday.

Each of the 57 local draft boards in Oregon will contribute from two to 45 men. Klamath county board, with 45 men, will supply the largest number of draftees. This is the second largest call since the selective service law was enacted. Approximately 980 Oregon men were called last February.

The dates for reporting at the induction station, together with the number of men to be furnished by each local board include:

October 7—Benton county board 2 men, Clackamas county board 2, 24 men.

October 9—Yamhill county board 11 men; Tillamook county board 9 men.

October 10—Linn county board 20 men; Marion county board No. 3, 15 men.

October 14—Polk county board 20 men.

October 16—Lincoln county board 15 men.

October 17—Klamath county board No. 2, 45 men; Washington county board No. 1, 15 men; Clackamas county board No. 2, 2 men; Lane county board No. 1, 3 men; Marion county board No. 1, 4 men; Marion county board No. 2, 2 men.

City and County Jail Population Mounts as Rains Continue; Many Wet Inside, Also, Say Officers

An increase of more than 30 per cent in Salem city and county jail population within 48 hours was blamed Friday night to rainy weather.

Ten men in the city cells and 19 in the county jail early in the evening were augmented later by other "easily-caught" miscreants, peace officers said. Too many had sought warmth from intoxicants, they declared, and others, like Otto Dewey Lindsey, colored, just "gave themselves up."

Lindsey, walking into the sheriff's office late Thursday told the deputy on duty that he was "wanted, oh, for numerous little things like desertion," explaining that the desertion charge grew out of domestic rather than military affiliations. A telegraphic check-up with Kalamazoo, Mich., police officers revealed Friday that Lindsey definitely was not "wanted" there, in spite of his assurances to the contrary. Meantime, the man had been booked as a vagrant and sentenced in justice court to 10 days in jail.
