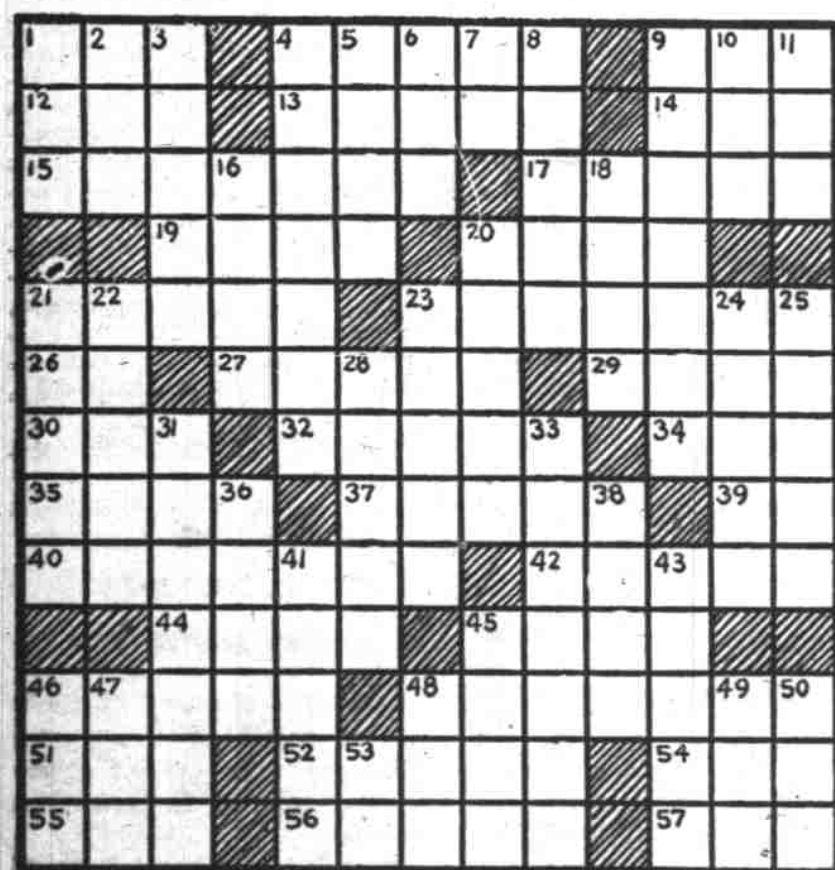
Divorce Asked in Suit at Dallas

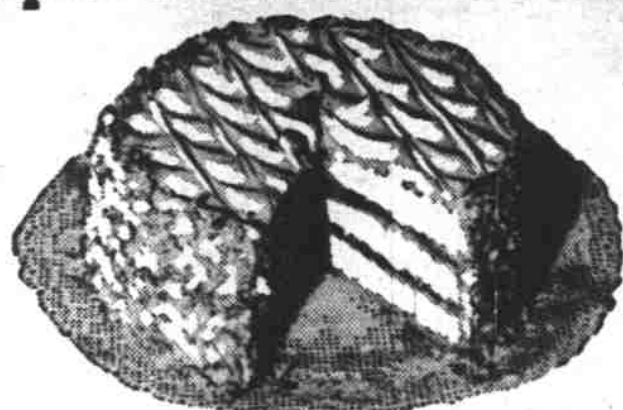
