Book Values Of Buildings Is Revealed

Oregon's capitol buildings have a book value of \$4,404,501, according to an inventory completed here Thursday by the state property control division.

These buildings, together with their equipment, were appraised at \$4,413,349.

Oregon State college, with an appraisal of \$5,890,437, tops all state property valuations. Valuation of the University of Oregon was placed at \$4,082,879.

Other outstanding valuations included the state highway commission, \$4,780,129; University of Oregon medical school \$1,306,131; Oregon state hospital \$3,302,389; Eastern Oregon state hospital \$1,338,521; state penitentiary \$1,237,391; Fairview Home \$1,182,745; and Oregon national guard, \$1,054,598.

Total appraisal of all state property for 1941, excluding lands, was \$38,868,716, or approximately \$2,000,000 in excess of that for 1940.
