Articles of Incorporation Filed By State Poultry Improvement Board With County Clerk

A copy of articles of incorporation for the new Oregon Poultry Improvement board, non-profit organization, were filed Friday with Marion County Clerk U. G. Boyer.

Organization, authorized by the last legislature, is for the purpose of bettering Oregon's poultry, by official supervision of breeding flock selection and testing for disease, the articles declare. The board is to act as official state agency for the National Poultry Improvement plan.

Signing the articles as president was J. R. McRae, Milwaukee; C. Y. Coyle, St. Paul, signed as vice president, and Noel L. Bennison of Oregon State college as secretary. Annual meeting of the board, which is to be comprised by 11 persons, most of them selected ex officio, is slated for the second Monday in July at Salem.

Membership on the board is to go to the president and secretary of the Oregon Poultry Improvement association, president and secretary of the Oregon Turkey Improvement association, a commercial poultryman and a commercial turkey operator meeting specific requirements, the director of the state department of agriculture, chief of the division of animal industry, the poultry extension specialist of Oregon State college, the poultry veterinarian in charge of the official laboratory and a supervisor of operations to be named by the balance of the membership at its regular meeting.

Also filed Friday were articles of incorporation for Weber & Winter Lumber company, with 50 shares of capital stock at \$100 par each. Principal office of the concern, which, according to its articles, is to engage in buying and selling of timberlands and equipment, in logging, lumbering and sawmill business, is to be at Turner. Incorporators are M. W. Weber, J. G. Winter and Aline L. Winter.
