SEATTLE, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Seattle's rollicking Rainiers, who came from the ruck to win their third straight Pacific Coast league baseball championship, did it again Tuesday night in the Staughness playoff, first round.

Facing the prospect of elimination by a single setback, the Rainiers blanked Hollywood twice by 2 to 0 scores to win the seven-game series and the right to face Sacramento for the president's cup. Seattle won Tuesday night on two brilliant right-handed pitching performances. Ed Cole let the Stars down with three scattered hits in the first game and "Kewpie" Dick Barrett came back to give them only four in the seven-inning nightcap.

Third Sacker Dick Gyselman drove in both Seattle runs in the second game. He got the third of three Seattle singles in the second inning, and he singled home the other run after a walk and a single by Al Niemiec. Shortstop Ned Stickle scored both runs.
