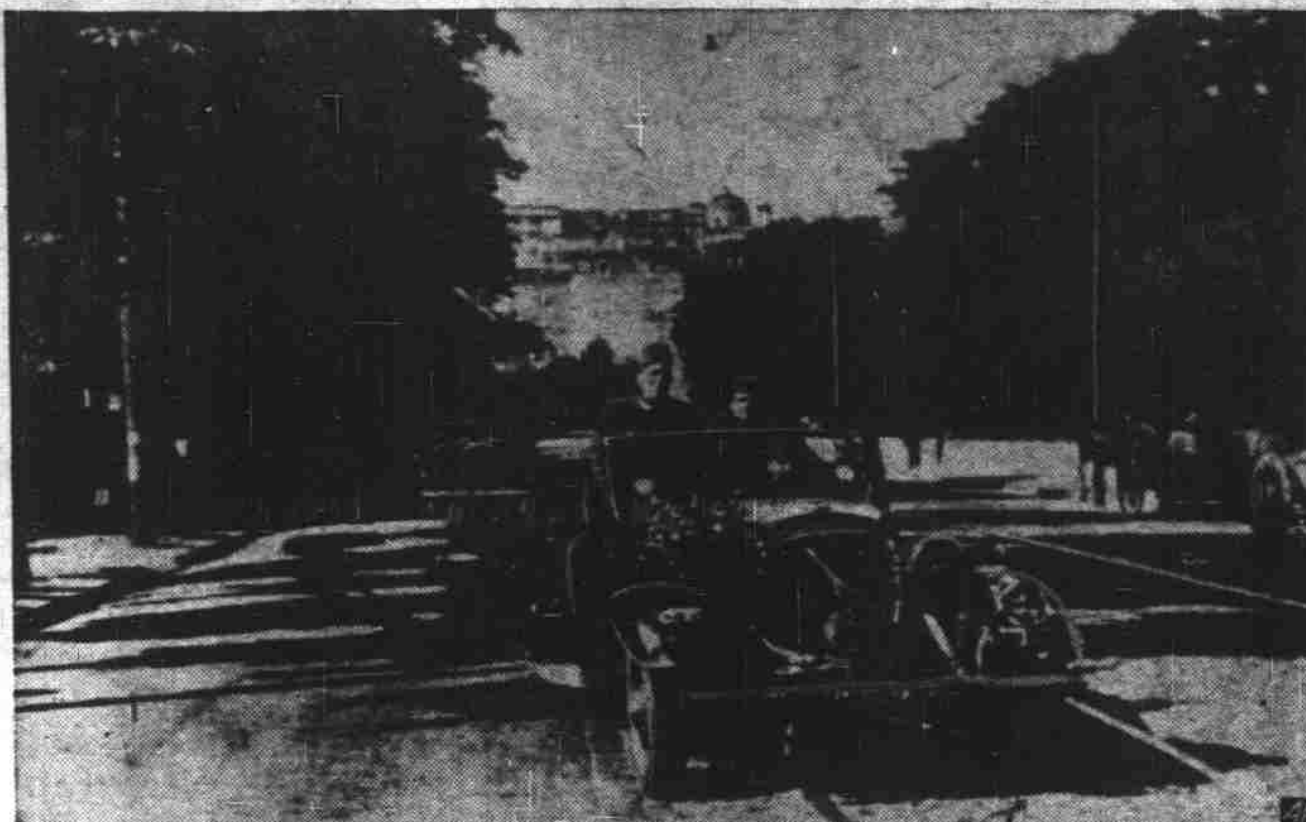
Motors to Burns
