## Woman Defendant in Bad Checks Charges Bound Over to County Grand Jury by Justice Felton

Marie Young, billed on the warrant used in her arrest as "alias Eugenia Stevens," was bound over to the Marion county grand jury Friday after preliminary hearing before Justice Joseph Felton.

Mrs. Young, who came to Salem from Vancouver, Wash., for the justice court appearance, had previously denied any identification with the woman who wrote and cashed worthless checks at a Salem hotel during her week. She entered no testimony Friday, only witnesses at the hearing being the clerk who had filed one of the charges of obtaining money by false pretenses against her and a representative of the Portland bank on which the checks in question were written.

Bail, previously set at \$1000, was allowed to remain at the same figure.

**UNIVERSITY HEAD GIVES SERMON AT FIRST METHODIST CHURCH**

Dr. Carl Sumner Knopf, president of Willamette university, will preach his initial sermon in an Oregon Methodist church as president of the university, when he speaks at the First Methodist church here Sunday.

Last March, the First church celebrated its 100th anniversary and next February Willamette university will celebrate its centennial. All of the presidents of the university for 100 years have been official Board members of First church.

Some 70 preachers have been licensed by this church and 18 missionaries have been sent abroad, three of whom are now in active service in other lands. "They have all received their education at the university. 'It is fitting indeed,' said the pastor, Dr. J. C. Harrison, 'that Dr. Knopf should preach his first sermon in this old church which has come down through the years side by side with the university.'"

Dr. Knopf brings one of the best trained and profound minds, and experienced personalities that has led the university and influenced the destiny of the church over these long years. Dr. Harrison pointed out. He is a graduate of the Yale Divinity school and has his earned Ph.D. from Yale university. His authorship, speaking and preaching ability are known all over America and in other lands.

The Cathedral choir will sing "What Are These That are Arranged" by Stainer and Dean Melvin Geist will be the morning soloist singing "Fear Not Ye O Israel" by Dudley Buck. Dr. Harrison will have charge of the service.

## Presbyterians Slate Special Church Rites

On Sunday morning, Presbyterians in Salem will join with Presbyterians in the far corners of the world in observance of World Wide Communion day.

The observance will start with a service in Japan and Chosen (New York time, 9 p. m. Saturday), and follow the sun with services in China, Siam, India, Iraq, Syria, Africa, South America, and so to the American time belts.

An hour after the Pacific coast communion the members in Alaska will have their services in outposts within the Arctic circle at Point Barrow and at St. Lawrence island. Mrs. Klereker, at Point Barrow, is the daughter of a Chosen missionary who helps to start the World Wide Communion day, while his daughter helps to close it.

Most of the larger Protestant denominations in the world also observe this special day within their memberships.
