PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 11-(AP)-An additional 1,000,000 pounds of wool were placed on sale here Saturday despite sluggish bidding at the opening of the annual Pacific northwest wool auction Fri-

Prices were above the market average, the highest being 46 cents a pound on 77,000 pounds of valley three-eights blood and 70,000 pounds of valley quarterblood. Only 306,750 of the 1,000,-000 pounds were sold however.

Hay production was estimated at near 97,000,000 tons compared with last year's big crop of 95,-000,000 tons and a ten year average of less than 80,000,000 tons.

The condition of western cattle and sheep ranges appeared to be the best since 1927, the department said. The condition of pastures elsewhere was said to be the second highest since 1928. Milk production on October 1 was at record levels.

## **Cranberries Seen To Be Plentiful**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11-(AP)-There'll be plenty of cranberries for everybody to eat heartily at either one or both of the Thanksgiving day feasts this year.

The agriculture department estimated today that the 1941 crop would be 725,100 barrels, an increase of 144,800 barrels over the previous season.

For the major producing areas the 1941 estimates against 1940 productions included Washington, 36,000 and 25,200; Oregon, 11,100 and 12,100.

## **Sugar Beet Yield Forecast Is Down**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11 -(AP)-A sugar beet crop of 9,933,000 tons, about 19 per cent below the record 1940 yield of 11192,-000 tons, was forecast today by the agriculture department. Indicated production of sugar beets by states, compared with production last year, in thousands of short tone, included:
