Punch Recipe Is New

Here's a rather unique recipe for punch. The dried apricots give good flavor and the tea, bulk.

- HALLOWEEN PUNCH**
(to serve 20)
1/2 pound dried apricots
1 1/2 cups sugar
Juice 4 lemons (about 1 cup)
Juice 6 oranges (about 2 cups)
1 pint cider
1 quart strong tea
2 quarts water
Maraschino cherries

Cover apricots with water and soak overnight. Bring gradually to boil (in same water), then simmer 15 to 20 minutes until quite soft. Rub through strainer. Add sugar and stir until dissolved. Add lemon juice, orange juice, cider, tea. Mix and add water to taste. Serve in punch bowl over block of ice. Garnish with maraschino cherries, and slices of oranges. Makes about 5 quarts or 20 measuring cups, serving two to three punch cups each to about 20 guests.

Quick Dish Is For Supper

At this busy season of year, with the activities of the new season getting under way, there are often days when the home-maker needs a quickly prepared yet satisfying main dish for dinner or supper. Here is one which will satisfy hearty appetites, yet takes only a short time to prepare.

LINK AND HONEY OMELET

- 1 pound sausage links
 - 2 tablespoons water
 - 1 No. 2 1/2 can hominy
 - 1 teaspoon salt
 - 1/4 teaspoon pepper
 - 3 eggs
 - 6 tablespoons milk
- Place sausage links in cold skillet. Add water, cover and cook until the water is evaporated. Remove cover, increase heat and brown the links. Remove from the skillet. Pour off all but four tablespoons of the fat. Add well drained hominy and seasonings and heat thoroughly. Add the beaten eggs and milk. Cook only until the eggs are set. Turn onto a chop plate. Arrange the sausage links over the top.

Serve with vegetable salad, whole wheat bread, stewed fruit and tea or milk.

Grapes in Jam Are Good

Concord grapes make a good spiced jam to add interest and variety to the canning supply.

- SPICED GRAPE JAM**
2 1/2 quarts (4 pounds) grapes
7 cups (3 pounds) sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup cider vinegar
2 sticks (4-inch) cinnamon
1 teaspoon whole cloves
- Wash and stem about 5 pounds under-ripe grapes. Weigh or measure into large preserving kettle and crush. Add sugar, salt, vinegar, and spices tied in cheesecloth bag. Cook until sugar is dissolved and mixture boils, stirring constantly. Boil rapidly 20 minutes, stirring frequently. Remove spice bag. Rub through sieve. Reheat to boiling. Remove from heat and skim. Pour immediately into clean, hot, sterilized jars or glasses and seal at once. Approximate yield: 7 half pint jars or 9 (6-ounce) glasses.
