A large group of members of the Salem branch Oregon State Music Teachers association met for luncheon Wednesday noon at the Argo hotel. Miss Dorothy Pearce, president of this district, presided at the business meeting following the luncheon and introduced the guest speaker, Mrs. Gertrude Goetz of Portland.

Mrs. Goetz, state chairman for membership in the OMTA outlined many interesting facts in the extension work and drive for membership throughout the state. She told of the growth of the Music Teachers association in the past ten years and explained the steps to be taken by music teachers in order to become state accredited.

Miss Frances Virginia Melton, state president of the Music Teachers association announced the slogan for the year: "Every accredited or qualified music teacher of the state of Oregon a member of the Oregon Music Teachers association."
