

Metal Work Classes Begin Soon At Woodburn; Clothing and Food Instructions Slated Weekly

WOODBURN—The metal work classes, which were held in the high school shop last spring, will be offered again this fall.

Beginning Monday instruction in forge, acetylene and electric welding, tempering, drilling, shaping and machinery repair will begin in the Woodburn high school shop.

Joseph Sowa, who has been accredited by the state department of vocational education to teach metal work classes, has been obtained as the instructor.

The classes will meet every night, Monday through Friday at 7 o'clock for three hour sessions. The complete course covers an eight week period.

All young men between the ages of 17 and 18 are urged to attend. Instruction is cost free.

This program is made available through the state board of vocational education and the Woodburn school board.

Homemakers classes will start Monday at 7:30 p. m. in the home economics rooms of the Woodburn high school.

Mrs. Charles Davis, Silverton, formerly of OSC, will instruct the class in clothing construction and design and Mrs. R. L. Guiss the class in foods. Both courses will stress consumer buying.

The classes will be held the same hour every week, Monday, for a period of 10 weeks, and is open to anyone without charge. There is still time to enroll before Monday, October 20.

Technical Tax Problems Talked At Collectors' Group Parley; Officers for Year Elected

A number of tax problems, some resulting from amendments to the tax laws at the 1941 legislative session, were discussed at a meeting of the State Tax Collectors association here Friday. Virtually every county in the state was represented.

Policing, billing and collection of timber taxes were stressed by Howard E. Conkle, appraisal engineer for the state tax commission, followed by an explanation of Lane county's new tax collection system by Alex P. McKinney, deputy tax collector of that county.

O. J. Grace, Multnomah county's deputy tax collector, spoke on "Stub Tax Receipts" vs. the "Duplicate System." Personal property tax collecting was discussed by M. R. Calhoun.

The new 1941 tax laws, changing the date for payment of taxes from March to November, were explained by James G. Smith, attorney for the tax commission. He said these tax law amendments would prove beneficial to the average taxpayer for the reason there would be a substantial interim between the dates of paying state and federal income taxes and the state property tax.

A round table discussion followed during which many technical tax problems were considered. Earl Fisher, in charge of the income tax division of the state tax commission, addressed the tax collectors at their noon luncheon. Charles V. Galloway, commission chairman, opened the session and participated in the round-table discussions. McKinney was elected president of the association. Other officers are Amy Ross, Linn county, vice-president; T. J. Brabec, Marion county, secretary-treasurer, and Vena Hoskins, Umatilla county, assistant secretary-treasurer.

Named to a constitution and by-laws committee for the association which is going through reorganization, were Sheriff W. M. Harper of Benton county; Mrs. Forrest Yexley of Polk, and H. C. Darby, Douglas.

A. C. Burk, Marion sheriff, heads the legislative committee, on which are also Sheriff Allen Birch of Tillamook and James G. Smith, an attorney with the tax commission. Place for next year's meeting was left to decision of the executive committee comprised by Sheriff Martin, Multnomah; M. R. Calhoun, Columbia, and T. B. Hooker, Polk.

Tax Collections Better This Year Than in 1940 Says Sheriff

DALLAS—A comparison of 1941 tax collections with collections at the same time a year ago was released this week by T. B. Hooker, Polk county sheriff.

The total 1940 tax roll to be collected was \$561,127.47 and on October 14, last year, \$401, 139.90 has been collected or 71.4 per cent. From January 1, 1940 to October 14, 1940, \$173,200.46 has been collected or a total of \$574,340.35.

Of the 1941 tax roll, payment of \$351,907.45 has been made or 74.6 per cent of the \$471,556.91 to be collected. \$139,796.78 in delinquent taxes has been collected since January 1 of this year or a total of \$491,704.23.

The total of all taxes collected in 1940 up to October 14 amounted to 102.4 per cent of the 1940 roll as compared with 104.4 per cent of the 1941 roll on the same date this year.

The 1941 tax rolls are some \$90,000 less than those of the preceding year. Although there has been less money collected in 1941 than 1940, a better percentage of collections has been made. The fourth quarter of 1941 tax will be due and payable December 15.

Hooker stated that a list of 1937 delinquent real property will be turned over to the district attorney October 20 for foreclosure and will be advertised on tax foreclosure.
