**New Agreement Offered**—A substitute agreement to be entered into by Marion county court and the Bonneville authority providing for 33 powerline crossings of county roads has been received by the court. It was drawn to replace an earlier agreement which did not provide for several crossings of dead end roads found necessary in establishing the line on a slightly-changed route, the court has been informed. None of the crossings permitted in the southern end of the county and later found unnecessary have been included in the new agreement, which provides that any damage to roads is to be repaired at the expense of the federal government.

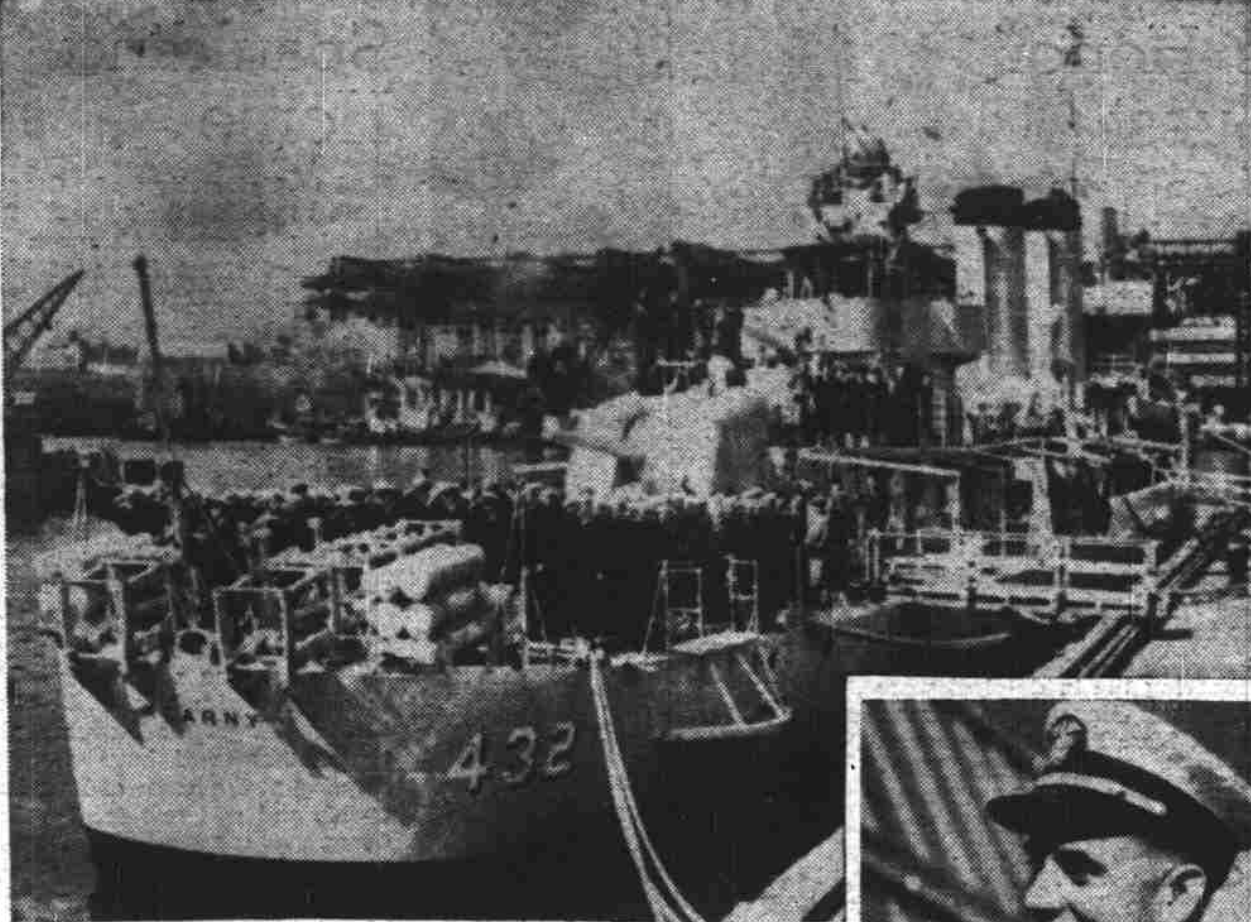

### Here's Torpedoed US Destroyer and Commander



The new \$5,000,000 USS destroyer Kearny, on patrol duty in the North Atlantic, was struck by a torpedo October 17 about 350 miles southwest of Iceland but escaped any serious damage and is proceeding under its own power. It was presumed the Kearny opened fire under President Roosevelt's "shoot first" order but the Navy Department had no further details on the incident first in which an American warship has been struck since World War II began. No casualties were reported suffered by the 11 officers and 290 men estimated to have been aboard. What happened to the attacking craft was not immediately disclosed. One of Uncle Sam's latest destroyers, she was launched at Kearny, N.J. shipyard in March, 1940. The destroyer is pictured above at the time she was commissioned in the Brooklyn Navy Yard. Her crew salutes while an officer raises Old Glory from the stern staff. The Kearny's five-inch afterdeck gun looms over the head of the crew. The luck of Lieutenant Commander Anthony Leo Danis, 42, commander of the USS Kearny, still holds. Long known as one of the luckiest men in the navy, Danis escaped the torpedoing without injury to himself or crew. He took command of the Kearny last year. He is one of the survivors of the dirigible Macon, which plunged into the Pacific off Point Sur, and he escaped by the narrowest margins the disasters to the dirigibles Shenandoah and Akron. A native of Woonsocket, R.I., Danis was graduated from Annapolis in 1922, served in the Naval Bureau of Aeronautics, studied at the Geophysical Institute, in Bergen, Norway, in 1937, and is regarded an expert in meteorological and hydrographic survey work. ### Only Parents Make Appeal For Clemency

Only direct appeal for clemency for James Harvey Thomas, 19, under death sentence for the slaying of Douglas Smith, salesman, near Arlington, has been made by Mr. and Mrs. A. N. Thomas, the boy's parents, Gov. Charles A. Sprague declared here Monday.

Petitions reported to have been circulated at Holyoke, Colo., Thomas' former home, and at Condon, asking that the death sentence be commuted to life imprisonment, had not been received at the governor's office Monday noon. Thomas is scheduled to die in the lethal gas chamber in the state penitentiary here Thursday, October 30.

Mr. and Mrs. Thomas arrived here recently from Colorado and were reported to have conferred with Gov. Sprague on two or three occasions. The governor has refused to comment on the case.

Smith was killed by Thomas, while en route from Idaho to Aberdeen, Wash., where the former's mother was reported seriously ill. Thomas was hitch-hiking and was invited to ride in Smith's automobile.
