

Cornerstone Laid for Memorial Cottage; Sawmill Completion Near; Turner Teachers Honored

TURNER—A cornerstone for the 10th and newest of the cottages built by the Turner Memorial Home was laid Sunday with appropriate ceremonies. The cottage will be known as the Eliza Dingle cottage in honor of the donor Mrs. Eliza Dingle, Wasco.

The main address was given by Rev. Guy L. Drill, Salem; scripture reading, Rev. J. L. Ellis, Turner; laying of the corner stone, Thos. Dalke, Salem contractor and builder of the cottage, assisted by Henry R. Leep and Fred E. Bates, vice president and secretary respectively, of the board of trustees of the home; talk by Rev. E. J. Gilstrap, superintendent of the Memorial home. Rev. Gene Robinson, pastor of the Turner Christian church, presided.

Open house was held in the near by Figueroa cottage, the home of Rev. and Mrs. M. B. Madden, retired missionaries to Japan.

The superstructure of the sawmill being constructed here by the Weber and Winter Lumber company is nearing completion. Saws will be turning within the next three or four weeks, at first to saw out dimension sizes and lumber for use in the mill building.

Electric power will be used and last week they were in receipt of a 150 horse-power electric motor, brought from Chicago by truck. This motor will be used to power the man saws. Later a planer is to be installed with power to be gotten from two large water wheels on the site.

A log pond is being excavated at the north end of the mill.

A. E. Battles is feeling much better after being confined to his home by illness.

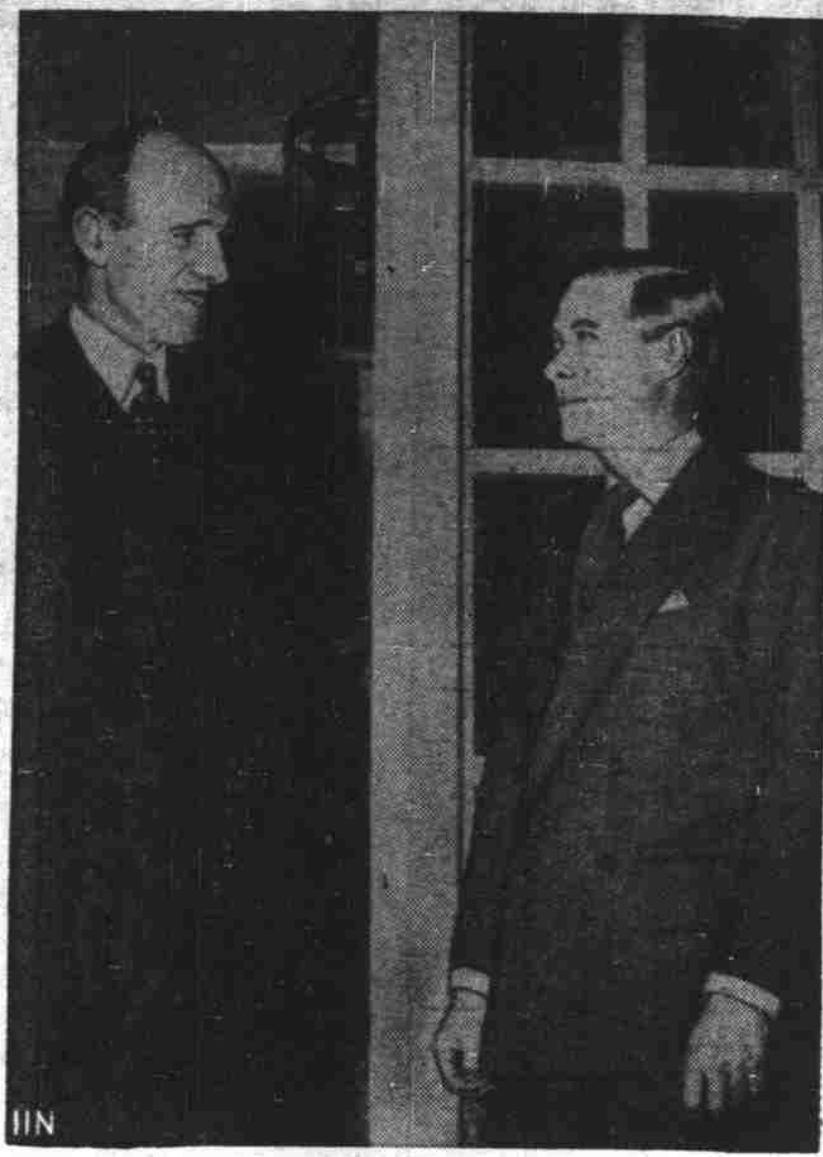
The Red Hills Sunday school district convention will be held at Rosedale November 2. Bertha Skelton, Salem Heights, is secretary-treasurer.
