

Under the plan salary adjustments are made quarterly based upon telegraphic reports as to living Cr costs received from the United States bureau of labor. The figures just released by the bureau for the quarter ending September 15, 1941, indicate that living costs in Oregon have increased 11 per cent over the base figure which the department takes as the average prevailing for the interval from 1935 to 1939.






