

# Lutheran Group Elects Officers and Names Bend 1942 Host City

## Church Conferences at Silverton End; Eugene Pastor Chosen to Head State Circuit; 300 Attend

SILVERTON—Rev. L. K. Johnson, Klamath Falls, was elected president of the Oregon circuit, Norwegian Lutheran church of America, at the Tuesday morning session of the group, convening at Trinity church here.

Others chosen were Rev. H. J. Thorpe, Eugene, vice president; Rev. Norris Thompson, Bend, secretary, and Rev. H. Aalbu, Eugene, treasurer. Rev. A. Krahel, Portland, is outgoing president.

Bend was chosen for the 1942 convention city.

Mrs. H. Rogen, Monitor, is president of the Women's Mission federation, which is also in session here. Serving as secretary is Mrs. Melvin Johnson, Woodburn.

Theme for the convention, which has attracted about 300 delegates, is the 1943 centennial of the Lutheran church in America.

City Manager E. K. Burton, Mayor Reber Allen, Councilmen R. A. Fish and L. F. Tucker were the only city officials who turned out for the final hearing on the city budget Monday. Citizens could have voiced their questions or opinions on the budget at this time but since none appeared the budget becomes effective.

Total estimated expenditures were listed at \$26,480.20 with bonds and interest at \$18,764.20 to form the biggest item. The city's indebtedness as shown by the budget was \$143,472.96, but city officials said that \$2000 of this sum had been paid since the budget was drawn up a few weeks ago.

Four cases came up before Judge Bert Terry in police court over the week-end. In each Chief of Police Victor Grossnickle was the arresting officer. Judge Terry, in reporting the cases, said that one amusing thing in their connection was that the men arrested were almost unanimous in their praise of Silverton officers.

Arrested were Oscar Wenger and Frances Robbins, both on disorderly conduct charges. Wenger paid \$5 and \$2.50 costs and Robbins was charged \$10 and costs. Bernard J. Scharbach paid \$5 and costs on a reckless driving charge and Henry Grabenkan, Mt. Angel, paid the same on a drunken charge.

## Lebanon Mill Puts in Equipment For Handling Yellow Fir Logs

LEBANON—Establishment of plywood plants in Albany, Lebanon and Sweet Home has stimulated logging of yellow fir and has brought to market a kind of log which most of the mills in this vicinity are not equipped to handle.

They have been shipped to Portland. Now the Sewell-Wynn mill is putting in equipment which will enable them to handle these logs too.
