Cadillac, Observes Anniversary Of 40 Years, Presents Models Designed to Enhance Prestige

Cadillac is observing its fortieth anniversary year with six series of 1942 models destined to enhance further the company's prestige as a builder of quality automobiles, it was announced this week.

New comfort, new ease of operation, new economy and reliability are apparent in each of the series, but an even more dominant note is sounded in an advance of a style motif that Cadillac pioneered a year ago.

Both from an appearance and a factual standpoint, the latest cars are wider and lower. A width measurement of 81 inches and a height of 63 inches on one of the sedans furnishes an example of how designers have achieved the fleet, low-slung lines that are most admired by the American automobile owner. Mechanically as well as in beauty the new Cadillacs have increased spirit.

Important to passenger comfort is the previously mentioned motion-induced ventilating system; to driving security a new development in brakes; and, to operation, a thermostat control that assures a quicker motor warmup. Important, as well, is news that a greater number of Cadillac-engineered Hydra-Matic drives will be available in 1942.

The Cadillac All-Weather Ventilating system was worked out in conjunction with the anti-draft ventilators which Cadillac helped to originate. It is a fresh air induction method with ducts leading through the greatly increased cooling area of the grille into the passenger compartment. Two instrument panel buttons control the opening of these ducts, so that they may be individually adjusted. A complete turnover in passenger compartment air is possible in a few seconds.

Appreciably aiding summer driving comfort, the designer likewise has superior winter advantages. Tied in with the Cadillac three-way heating unit, which offers a fixed temperature control similar to that afforded by household thermostats, it becomes a means of quickly circulating warm air in the coldest weather.

The super-safe brakes which Cadillac introduces were devised to make high speed breaking more secure. Heat generated by braking must be dissipated quickly and in the past this has presented a problem during frequent sharp decelerations over a brief span of time. A new brake drum construction, heavier than formerly used by automobiles, is one secret of continuous positive action. In addition, the breaking system incorporates a new design in sealing that guarantees safety under all driving conditions.

A cooler-running engine is made possible by a 10 per cent increase in the car's frontal ventilation area. The thermostat control is the best yet devised for an engine of the V-8 type. Specifically it functions to direct the water away from the radiator until a certain temperature has been reached. This is a contribution both to rapid engine warmup and increased passenger comfort, since wiper heaters are connected to the system. Cadillac's complete program for 1942 covers 20 body types. Series Sixty-one has two types, the Sixty-two has five, including a convertible; the Sixty-three, one; the Sixty Special, two; the Sixty-four, four, and the Sixty-five, six.

Sprague Sees Oregon Set For Wartime

CORVALLIS, Oct. 29 — (P) — Oregon will have less trouble than many other states in adjusting its industrial economy to a wartime footing, Gov. Charles A. Sprague said Wednesday.

He told chamber of commerce members that some trouble was to be expected, such as that caused in the lumber industry since priorities have reduced the markets, but that for the most part the state's industries were basic and essential.

The governor decried labor struggles and asserted that labor had the biggest stake in the war. "To see this, all the laborer has to do is look at labor's status in totalitarian countries," he said.

He declined comment on the state board of higher education's action Tuesday in restoring science courses to the University of Oregon, and said it was the responsibility of the board.
