

Turner Girl Joins Kansas Girl With Identical Names on Campus Of Phillips University, Okla.

ENID, Oklahoma, Oct. 31.—A picture that appeared in a Sunday school magazine ten years ago started a friendship between two girls that was climaxed recently when the girls met for the first time on Phillips university's campus here.

To make things even more interesting, both girls have the same name and neither is any relation to the other.

For the first time a few weeks ago Margaret E. Gilstrap, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Gilstrap of Turner, met Margaret F. Gilstrap of Great Bend, Kansas.

"It was the biggest thrill of my life," declared Margaret E. Gilstrap, referring to the first time she saw Margaret F. "What did we do when we first saw each other? Why, we just threw our arms around each other and cried 'Margaret!'"

In 1931 Margaret E. Gilstrap (Turner) saw in a Sunday school magazine a picture of Margaret F. Gilstrap (Kansas). This picture was taken of a Sunday school class taught by Margaret F.'s mother, Mrs. G. C. Gilstrap, of Great Bend.

Margaret E. decided that anyone with exactly the same name as hers would be an interesting "pen pal," so she started off the correspondence by writing Margaret F. In the ten years since that time the two girls have carried on their friendship through regular letters, cards, presents and souvenirs.

In the course of their corresponding with each other, Margaret E. and Margaret F. began making plans for getting together some place and really becoming acquainted with each other. About four or five years ago they both decided definitely to come to Phillips university, but their plans did not materialize until this fall, Margaret E. is a junior and Margaret F. is a sophomore this year.

Margaret F. says enthusiastically, "We're glad our names are the same." She and Margaret E. have become inseparable companions—the female Damon and Pythias of the campus, as it were.

When the two girls began checking up on themselves, they found that there are a remarkable number of points of similarity in themselves as well as in their families.

There is only 11 months difference in their ages, Margaret E. being the older. Their eyes are quite similar in color and shape, and each has a great love for music. Both of the girls were active in Christian Endeavor work in their respective states at the same time, and now the two are enrolled in the Bible college together.

The thing that bothers the girls considerably is the fact that they both lived in Kansas at the same time, when they were small children, less than 100 miles apart.

"Why couldn't we be far enough ahead to become friends when we were close together?" lamented Margaret E. and Margaret F.

Both Margarets are in agreement on their favorite color—blue—and their pet peeve—"people who gripe." Hiking and housework both come in for a great deal of hearty approbation from both girls.

Even the families of the two Margarets are alike in several respects. There are four children in both families, and Margaret E. has a sister who closely resembles one of Margaret F.'s. All members of each family are workers in the Christian church. Margaret E.'s father is a minister and Margaret F.'s father is an elder.

The hardest thing for the two girls to do is to find points of divergence in their likes and dislikes. After questioning them at length, this dissimilarity was found—Margaret E. likes cheese, but Margaret F. dislikes it intensely.

Sometime in the near future the girls plan to visit in each other's home.

There is one point at which the two girls have agreed not to have things in common.

"We've decided to share everything except one—certain letters," said Margaret E. with a smile.

Land-Use Committees Function In Proposed Cantonment Area

DALLAS—At a meeting held at the Oregon College of Education auditorium at Monmouth for land owners in the proposed cantonment area, a committee of seven area land owners was elected, according to districts in the area for both Benton and Polk counties. Three districts in Polk county and two districts in Benton county each elected a representative and, then in addition to these, one committeeman was elected at large from each county.

Claude Buchanan, Corvallis, presided over the meeting, which was called by a subcommittee of the joint land-use committees of Benton and Polk counties, of which Buchanan had served as chairman.

The meeting was called to suggest and recommend on the part of these land-use committees that further work done relative to the cantonment in the two counties be carried on by a committee of land owners within the area instead of the land-use committees. Those present unanimously favored the idea. Elected were: Polk county, southern area, C. J. DeArmond; central area, Gus Fleischmann; northern area, Claude Hoisington; committeeman-at-large, Earl Anderson, Benton county, western area, Ed Blake; eastern area, Owen Cook; committeeman at large, L. C. Williamson. The mailing address for each of the Polk county committeemen is Monmouth and for each of the Benton county committeemen, route one, Corvallis.

Because certain problems are involved in both federal and state income tax returns to people making sales in an area such as this, a special committee consisting of Owen Cook and L. C. Williamson were given the job of securing information that could later be supplied to land owners in this connection.

Preliminary plans were also set up for developing an organization to list and perhaps appraise farms for sale in the Willamette valley that farmers in this area may be interested in purchasing later on.

It was reported that several agents and others had been active within the district trying to sell farms to the land owners most of which will be good prospects if the army takes over the area.

The committee definitely advises property owners with farms to sell not to give exclusive listings to real estate agents as has been reported by some of the people in the area who have been contacted by agents reporting that they have exclusive listings on large numbers of farms properties.

Listed to work out this particular matter are C. J. DeArmond, Ed Blake and Earl Anderson. This committee no doubt will enlist the support of real estate agencies and

According to representatives of the army staff, this is the first cantonment area in the United States where a committee organization of this type has been effected and if this plan proves satisfactory here, it may serve as a pattern or example not only for the army but for other areas where cantonments may be considered in the future.

Owners within the area are urged to contact any members of the committee when any information is at hand that should be useful or if any questions arise in the area that the owners themselves wish information on.

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Variety of Red Cross Activities Keep Silverton Women Busy

SILVERTON—Peace-time work has taken on war-time energy, says Mrs. Martin Hannan, local chairman of Red Cross activities. More interest is being shown, she said Thursday. Mrs. Hannan has served with the local Red Cross for nine years.

A Red Cross first aid class, which opened Wednesday, had 14 in attendance. At least twice that many could be accommodated, Mrs. Hannan reports. More might have called and gone home, too, she said, because they did not know that the side door, instead of the front door of the junior high school is being used.

Classes are taught in the basement each Wednesday night from 7:30 to 9:30 o'clock. At least 20 hours of study are required for examinations. There are no charges or expenses other than the purchase of a textbook. P. G. Deuber, Salem, is the instructor.

Home nursing classes, also under the auspices of the Red Cross are being carried Tuesday and Thursday nights at 7:30, with headquarters for these in the health center at the Eugene Field building.

A Red Cross sewing class is being opened in the former restaurant building at the corner of Oak and First streets. Mrs. C. W. Keene is in charge of this.

Project funds, which include three cents mileage for the instructor in home nursing and first aid, \$15 a month to the local milk fund in the public school, and so on, is obtained through the annual local Red Cross drive which will get underway on November 12.

Appointed as a standing committee to assist Mrs. Hannan in her work here are Glenn Briedwell, R. B. Duncan and H. W. Adams. A number of women will be asked to assist in the house-to-house Red Cross drive this year.

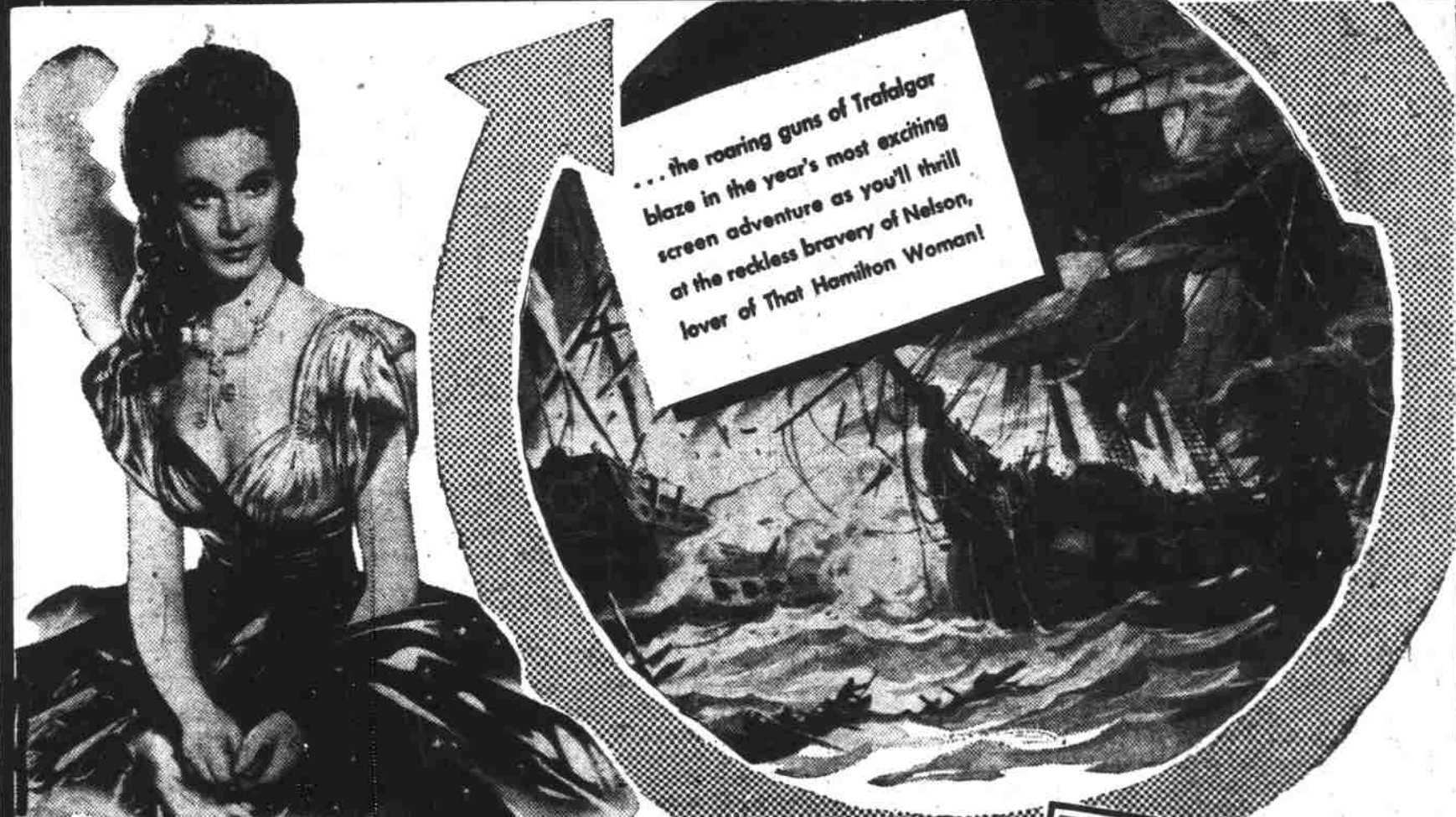
