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Pastor Ends Beckwith's Skein Of Victories; Gets Decision

Decisively Outpoints Negro Battler Who Won 17 in Row

CHICAGO, Ill., Nov. 7.—(AP)—Cagey Bob Pastor dramatically ended the 17-fight winning streak of Booker Beckwith, 21-year old son of a negro preacher, in the Chicago stadium Friday night by decisively outpointing him in ten savage rounds.

Pastor, a New York veteran of 56 battles, on the verge of being knocked out himself in the first round, came back to win the next nine by a vicious body attack. He began to pour misery into the youthful Gary, Ind., negro's body at the start of the second round and never let up.

Vernonia Falls To Prineville By 19-14 Count

PRINEVILLE, Nov. 7.—(AP)—Fullback Roy Lindstrom of Prineville plunged to a touchdown from the three-yard line in the closing minutes of a football game Friday to defeat the previously unbeaten Vernonia Loggers, 19 to 14.

Lindstrom also scored twice in the opening period, on runs of 50 and 30 yards.

Quarterback Culbertson ran 50 yards for Vernonia's first score in the second quarter, and raced 35 yards to give the Loggers a third-period touchdown and a brief lead. Vernonia was unscored on before the defeat.

BALTIMORE, Nov. 7.—(AP)—Tack a football frenzy onto a national defense boom, and you have a picture—a very confused picture, if it is to be a true one—of the city of Baltimore on the eve of the Navy-Notre Dame football game.

A statistician figured out the other day that defense industries have brought a quarter of a million people into this city in recent months. Saturday the 15th meeting of the Midshipmen and the Irish, each this time undefeated though once tied, will pack 66,000 people into Municipal stadium, and fully half of those will be from out of town.

Adding to the clamor is the fact that Navy, for once, is the favorite. The sailors have beaten Notre Dame three times during their series, but on each of those occasions their victories were considered upsets. They're not given much of an edge Saturday, but get what little there is.

Into action with the Middles and the Irish go two other major undefeated but tied eleven (army and Mississippi State, and the six all-winning eleven (Texas, Minnesota, Fordham, Duke, Texas A&M, and Duquesne).
