MT. ANGEL — The state traffic department will present a safety show at St. Mary's school Monday at 10:30 o'clock for the local youngsters and those of neighboring schools.

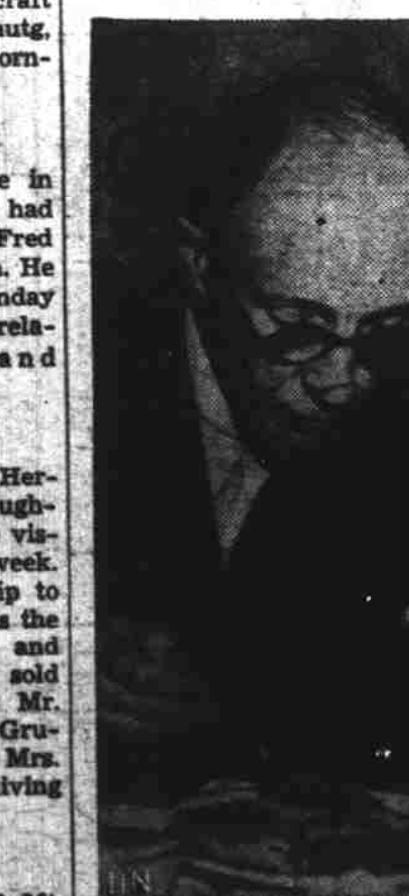
The schools of Hazel Dell, McKee, Harmony, Thomas and Grassy Pond have been invited.
