

Peace Group Votes Okeh Of Program

Voting almost unanimous approval of world government as outlined in five statements presented on a ballot, 130 persons joined in the fifth annual Salem peace rally held Armistice day at the First Christian church.

Co-sponsored by the Salem and Willamette student Fellowships of Reconciliation, the rally was presided over by Don Douris, Christian youth leader.

Dr. Carl Sumner Knopf, president of Willamette university, explaining the purpose of the FOR, whose members "work to abolish war and to foster goodwill among nations," declared he had been a member for many years.

Presentation of proposals for world government and the problems involved was made during a round table discussion led by Theodore G. Nelson, Marion county farm leader. Participants on the discussion panel also were Douris, R. Ivan Lovell, professor of history at Willamette, and John Whitaker, social case worker.

The ballot on world government was presented by Mrs. C. A. Downs of the Salem peace council. Miss Violet Swanson, Salem high school teacher, outlined the house joint resolution that would create a joint congressional peace commission to prepare for a world constitutional convention.

Advocating an "American peace offensive . . . for cessation of hostilities and achievement of a just peace, a petition signed by 77 persons was presented by Don Tasker, Willamette student.

Organ music for the meeting, which was one of a nationwide chain devoted to world government, was provided by Mrs. D. B. Kleihege. Rev. S. Raynor Smith, pastor of Jason Lee Methodist church, pronounced the benediction.

One Protest Filed Against Forestry Plan

Only one protest against the proposed reclassification of 2800 acres of Marion county land for reforestation purposes was presented to representatives of the state forestry department at a hearing in the county courtroom Wednesday. Representing a client opposed to the suggested change for a specified tract, George Duncan, Slayton attorney, entered the single objection.

Sitting with the forestry department group at the hearing were County Commissioner Jim E. Smith, County Land Agent H. William Thielsen and Donald M. Fisher, engineer with the state tax commission.

Under the proposal the lands examined, if approved for the reclassification, would be taxed five cents an acre annually with an additional severance tax when timber is cut.
