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aircraft and infantrymen, and it was said that every German attempt to regain their lost positions had failed.

The Germans had almost nothing to say about Moscow and Leningrad except to acknowledge powerful red counter-attacks, which were claimed to have been broken, but this revealing reticence on the part of the German command in the silence of the soviet command about the Crimea.

There, it appeared that the Germans were preparing to try to spring the strait toward the Krasnodar oil fields in the western Caucasus, and Berlin claimed that the last bombing planes were ranging as far east as the Caucasus mountain barrier.

This situation, undeniably critical for the Russians, was accompanied by yet longer and darker shadows over the relations of pro-ax Japan and the pro-British United States.

## US, Russian Envoys Safe

TEHERAN, Iran, Nov. 17-(AP)—US Ambassador Laurence Steinhardt and Maxim Litvinov, new soviet envoy to the United States, enroute to Washington to report on the German War, arrived here safely Monday after a blizzard-plagued five-day plane trip from Kulybyshev, auxiliary soviet capital.

The plane also carried Mrs. Litvinov, Sir Walter Monckton, British information service officer, Douglas W. Brown, former Massachusetts Tech professor who was the last member of the W. Averell Harriman mission to leave Russia, two American journalists, Quentin Reynolds and Alice Moats, and Mohamed Saad, Iranian ambassador to Moscow.

Steinhardt immediately began filing dispatches to the state department in Washington, and he and the others Monday night received batches of radiograms expressing relief at their safe arrival.

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offered an open shop agreement. We refused."

Mr. Roosevelt received also a report from the steel industry representatives—Benjamin Fairless of United States Steel, Eugene Grace of Bethlehem, and Frank Purnell of Youngstown Sheet & Tube. It was first delivered orally in the forenoon, but they promised a written report later.

Their written report, made public by the White House, recalled that contract negotiations with the UMW began in July, and said all issues "were disposed of, practically all in favor of the union," with the exception of the union shop demand.

On this, it said, the union refused to yield while "we firmly and sincerely believe that the right to work in our coal mines, or in any other industry, should not be dependent upon membership or non-membership in any organization." It closed with an expression of belief that "everything reasonably within our power has been done to avert a work stoppage."

The White House was silent, for the time being, on what the president might do in the light of his public assertion last week that production from the "captive" mines—which produce fuel for steel mills busy with armament orders—must be continued without delay, and his assurance to congress that "the government proposes to see this thing through."

But even before Mr. Roosevelt received the reports of the fruitless negotiations many members of congress were fuming for action for legislation to restrict strikes.

DETROIT, Nov. 17-(AP)—Without a dissenting voice, the Congress of Industrial Organizations Monday placed its unqualified support behind John L. Lewis and his United Mine Workers of America in their demand for a union shop in captive coal pits.

As the CIO opened its fourth annual convention here, delegates also applauded a call for "wholehearted" backing of President Roosevelt's foreign policy.

NEW YORK, Nov. 17-(AP)—Benjamin Fairless, president of the U. S. Steel corporation, declared Monday night the three major steel companies involved in the captive mine dispute would attempt to operate their mines and expressed hope it would not be necessary for the government to take them over.

JOHNSTOWN, Pa., Nov. 17-(AP)—Lewis Evans, an executive board member of district 2, CIO United Mine Workers, said Monday night that approximately 75 per cent of the union commercial miners in northern Cambria county had voted to strike Tuesday in sympathy with the "captive" mine walkout.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 17-(AP)—Wayne L. Morse, dean of the University of Oregon law school and arbitrator of the west coast waterfront labor questions, Monday resumed hearings on longshoremen's request for higher wages.

## Japs See War As Inevitable

Japan short of getting out of the Far East.

Moreover, Shanghai heard in good authority that Japan had asked the Indo-China government of Vichy France to provide facilities for 50,000 more Japanese troops in that colony "for defense," thus creating a force of about 100,000 there, and was not waiting for Vichy's answer to rush them in.

Speculation at once arose that a Japanese attack against South China or more likely against Thailand, which adjoins Indo-China and lies above Malaya and the British Pacific fortress of Singapore, was in sight.

The British, now pledged to join the United States in war upon Japan within an hour of the start of any such conflict, announced the arrival in Singapore of more Indian troops—the seventh group of reinforcements since September 1.

The Chinese generalissimo, Chiang Kai-shek, seized the opportunity to suggest that "the vital moment" to deal with Japan had struck, and his foreign minister observed:

"All signs seem to point in the direction of an ABCD alliance—that is, one of American, British, China and the Dutch East Indies."

The extraordinary envoy to Washington, Saburo Kurosu, talked during the day and his colleague, Ambassador Nomura, told the newspapermen: "Many things were said."

Official Washington's attitude was non-committal, if Kurosu made any headway at all he did so under extraordinary circumstances, his government having taken a bellicose tone before he had time to set foot in the White House.

The day brought a disclosure by Rear Admiral Frank Sadler, commander of the US naval district at Balboa, Canal Zone, that US naval patrols had been put to the alert on receipt of unconfirmed reports that a British-operated Yugoslav ship had been attacked in the Pacific, presumably by an axis raider.

He remarked that he had told "our people out there" of the report, and added:

"I think I can assure you that if a raider is operating in that area it will not be operating there long."

## Bomber Crash Fatal to Two

PARK CITY, Utah, Nov. 17-(AP)—An army bomber, rocked by a saving western storm, plunged to a fiery end in the snow lashed Wasatch mountains early Monday after five of the seven men aboard had parachuted to safety.

Major Robert E. L. Tipton, 34, Council Grove, Kan., plummeted several thousand feet to death with a torn chute trailing him in a high wind.

## Bridge Creek Road Plan Is Turned Down

Tax return from the lands served by the proposed Bridge Creek road would in nowise warrant expenditure for the road, County Judge Grant Murphy told a delegation of property owners from that area when they appeared Monday before the county court to ask reconsideration of the court's recent action disallowing a petition for construction of a road north of the old railroad right-of-way in that section.

"The policy has always been to put in roads where settlers have gone ahead," Murphy declared in response to a claim that the territory where no one now resides awaits only a road as signal for development.

## Salem Flood Crest Spent

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vided a guarantee that the flood in the Eugene area was on the wane.

At Salem, temperatures at 7 o'clock Monday morning stood at 31 degrees, 1 degree below freezing; at midnight Monday it had risen to 37, while maximum for the day was 49 degrees.

From Albany to the river's mouth the Willamette continued its slow rise Monday, but was expected to start its fall today without added damage to lowland areas.

Cattle in the mid-valley had been moved from river-bottom land and loss from high water around Salem was declared to be minor.

The sudden rise of the Calapoopa river near Albany Sunday reportedly trapped many sheep, but estimates of the loss were unavailable Monday.

The east-side Albany-Corvallis road was closed by the flood but the west-side route between the two cities remained open.

Highway travel in the upper reaches of the valley was resumed Sunday as the river commenced to drop.

Damages, unestimated Monday, were declared by Eugene residents to be the worst since the flood of 1927.

Height of the river today at Salem it is estimated will not exceed 16 feet, or sufficient rise to flood lowlands, at Albany, 18.5 feet, and at Portland, 10 feet.

The Santiam, which at Jefferson reached 11 feet Sunday, had started to drop by Monday morning. Temperature at the Santiam summit Monday had dropped to 18 degrees.

Three bulldozers are fighting their way through thousands of tons of earth, rocks and trees on the road along the Little North Fork of the Santiam to reopen the old road to travel and a new stretch to further construction.

It was estimated Monday that a week would be required to clear away the debris of the slide which covered more than 200 feet of the road and which may have damaged beyond repair the roadbed where the C & H Logging company had started construction of a low road for its heavy trucks.

The company, which has been operating on defense orders, and two lumber mills also principally occupied with defense orders, have ceased work and are blocked off by the slide.

High water damaged several small bridges and side roads in the Fox Valley vicinity, it was reported Monday night.

after the airport committee had demurred at the \$150 quotation.

By resolution the council made available from general funds \$1,500 for construction of a stone-wall along Shelton ditch in the park between Winter and Church streets to be expended for materials, the WPA possibly to provide labor. The resolution was proposed by the park commission with the approval of the council's committee on parks.

A property control board of three members, consisting of two members to be named by the mayor from the council and the city's purchasing agent, was created by adoption of an ordinance. As originally proposed, the ordinance provided that money from the sale of tools or equipment should be held for the credit of the commission, department or office which had owned the property; because the city departments have no revolving funds, Alderman O'Hara proposed an amendment to provide that the money should go back into the general fund. It was adopted.

The zoning change, recommended by the planning and zoning commission, was adopted following three readings to facilitate the power company's construction plans.

Question as to the legality of an ordinance levying costs upon property owners for work done by the city in cutting grass and brush was raised by City Treasurer Paul H. Hauser, who cited legal advice, and the ordinance, up for its third reading, was tabled for further investigation.

The allotment of \$30.00 to be used in payment of expenses for a group of police officers who attended a recent police school in Eugene was approved.

Hauser's report on bonding of properties for work done during the summer of 1941 showed collections of \$5368.07; bond applications for 49 other pieces of property for sums totaling \$5019.29, and 10 unpaid and unbonded pieces against which \$2416.58 is due. It was referred to the city attorney.

A resolution to provide for erection of a "stop" sign on the west side of 17th street at Ferry, where an obstructed view is reportedly responsible for frequent minor accidents, was referred to the traffic committee because wording of the introduction allegedly would have made 17th a "through" street.

Referred to committees also were the requests from a group of business persons and residents on Commercial between Mission and Miller streets asking that a restricted parking zone be established there, the request of Donald J. Rasmussen that a \$1 fine and towing charge assessed against him be refunded because he had been advised by the city attorney that his car was legally parked when removed by the police, a request for a parking restriction in front of 354 Kearny street, a billboard request and a number of beer license applications.

Permit to hang two canvas banners advertising the Elks Christmas benefit entertainment was granted as was also one for installation of a new group of gas tanks at Center and Commercial asked by Frank Doe Little.
