# **Stock Market** Is Listless

#### Stabs at Recovery Ineffective With **Labor Situation**

NEW YORK, Nov. 18-(AP)-The stock market made stabs at recovery Tuesday but continued cloudiness of the labor and international pictures rendered most ineffective.

The list got off to a ragged start, hardened after mid-day, then slipped again at the close. Losses of fractions to a point or so were in the majority.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was off .1 of a point at 39.5. Tax selling persisted throughout and helped put the day's turnover to 678,800 shares compared with 628,210 Monday.

Rails generally maintained their balance as White House conferences got under way in a move to settle the carrier wage disputs.

American Can again was a weak performer, dropping 3 points to a new 1941 bottom.


