

Eden Answers War Charges

Churchill Gets Vote Of Confidence After Row in Commons

a large number of reactionary fascists in this country."

Churchill himself stayed away from the debate, but his foreign secretary, Anthony Eden, rebuked the fiery Scot for declaring that "when this is all over the United States will hold us in financial bondage."

"That," he said, "is not true. Under the lease-lend arrangement there is no accounting and no debt piling up."

Eden also made these points:

1. Declared the present anti-communism conference in Berlin was the opening wedge for a new peace offensive, but that it would not effect "one jot" the determination of Britain to carry on the war and that, "I hope, the remaining neutral countries will not be deluded into listening to Hitler's plan for a new order."

2. Denied Nazi Foreign Minister von Ribbentrop's charge that Britain received assurance in 1940 that Russia would join the war on her side. He asserted Britain was continually handicapped by Russia's adherence to her pact with Germany prior to last July and "at no time until actually German troops had crossed the frontier was there any political or military conversation between us and the Soviet government—I wish there might have been."

Declaring Hitler needed a respite because of Russian resistance, Eden said "he is trying to persuade the nations of Europe that the only way they can get peace is by coming into his new order. He said that if they do that he would be successful in bringing the British and Americans to terms."

"He is wrong. He won't."

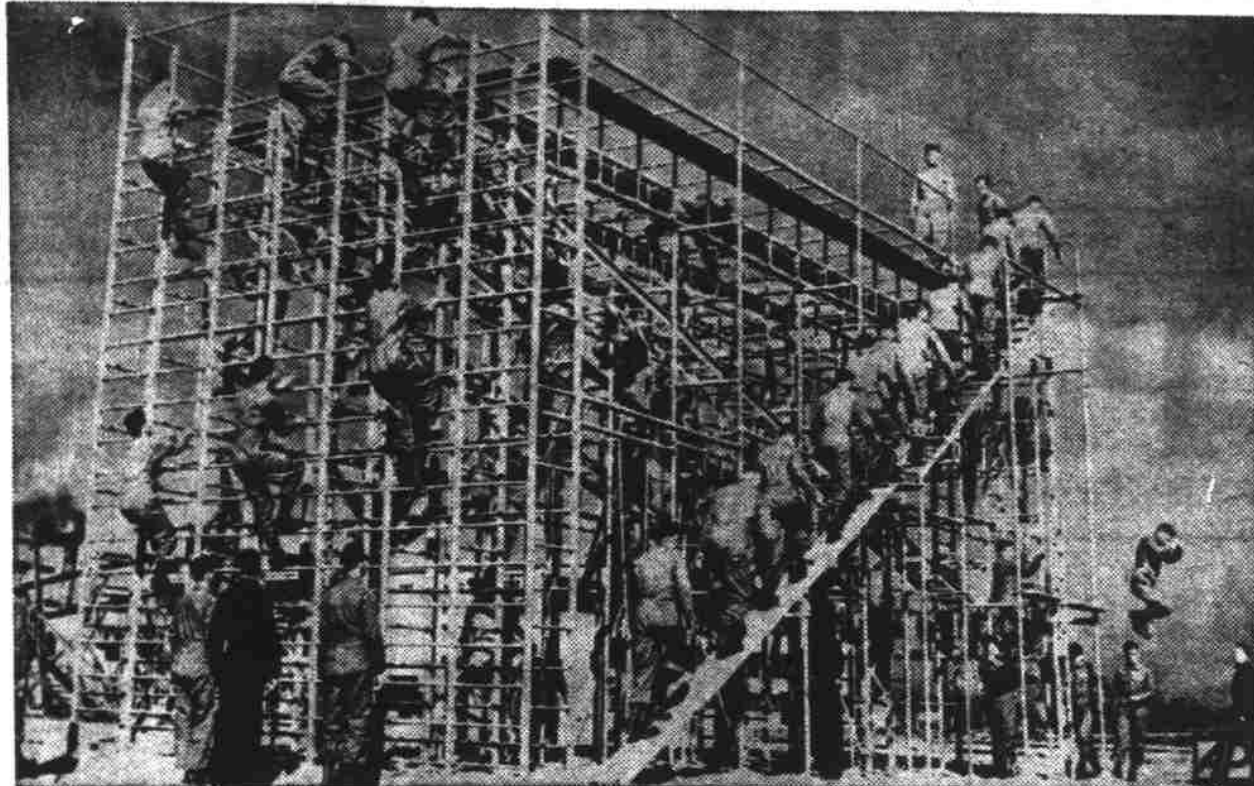

US Parachute Battalion Tests New Exerciser



Some 70 members of the 503rd parachute battalion swarmed over the new physical training structure which is being tested at Ft. Benning, Ga. The structure was developed by Dr. George T. Stafford, professor of physical education at the University of Illinois. It is 40 feet long, 20 feet high and 22 feet wide, includes 60 pieces of apparatus and permits 72 men to exercise at once.

Plans Nearly Completed on Cantonment

ALBANY, Nov. 27-(AP)—Plans for the proposed 40,000-acre Albany-Corvallis army cantonment virtually are completed, appraisals made and the way prepared for asking bids, Capt. T. E. Dittbrandt, constructing quartermaster, announces.

The contractor-architect offices here will be closed Dec. 3, except for a small staff left to make any necessary revisions. John W. Cunningham, contractor-engineer, and Abbott Lawrence and F. S. Allyn, architects, Portland, and their associates also will leave.

Captain Dittbrandt said the cantonment plans provided for a power supply line from the Bonneville substation at Albany. He had recommended complete electrical equipment for the camp and the cantonment may be the first in which electricity is used for cooking, baking and water heating in addition to lighting.

Alternate plans provide facilities for either one or two army divisions.

German Spy Tells Guilt

NEW YORK, Nov. 27-(AP)—Richard H. Kleiss, who was interned in the United States as a German naval officer in the World War, was in jail Thursday night as a confessed German spy.

One of 15 men on trial charged with espionage conspiracy, the middle-aged chief cook of United States Lines flagships Manhattan and America, pleaded guilty to the second count of a two-count indictment which charged that he delivered vital American defense secrets to Germany.

The chief sufferer will be Japan which has been taking about half of the Argentine production.

Wife of Noted Artist Files Divorce Action

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 27-(AP)—Mrs. John Held, Jr., former New Orleans bathing beauty, filed suit for divorce here Thursday from her well-known artist husband.

The suit stated they were married Nov. 11, 1931, in Stamford, Conn., and had not lived together for two years. No other grounds were given.

Death Takes Noted Indian

FORT HALL, Idaho, Nov. 27-(AP)—Edward La Vatta, 87, father of "the outstanding Indian of 1941" and for many years a leader of Bannock-Shoshone tribal activities, died Thursday.

Born at Fort Hall July 5, 1854, he attended the St. Boniface school in Canada and worked for the Canadian government for several years.

His son, George P. La Vatta of Portland, Ore., US Indian service employe, was named "outstanding Indian" by the national council fires at their Chicago meeting early this fall.

He died on the Fort Hall reservation tonight of a heart attack.

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Mexico Judge Holds Author In Death Case

MONTERREY, Mexico, Nov. 27-(AP)—Portland Arthur Torrance heard a judge Thursday order him held for further investigation of a "strong presumption of guilt" that he bludgeoned to death his wealthy, 67-year-old bride, the former Mrs. Ada Loveland of Kalamazoo, Mich.

A 38-page brief, read in Spanish and interpreted to the author and explorer, informed him that Judge Jesus B. Santos wanted further information on "the evidence that other women might be involved," "the possibility that Torrance was trying to get money from Mrs. Loveland," "the hasty burial" and "several other factors."

The state charges Torrance beat his wife to death with a vacuum bottle, but the 55-year-old New Yorker contends she was injured fatally in an auto accident near Monterrey.

US Treasury Will Borrow Huge Amount

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27-(AP)—Secretary Morgenthau announced Thursday that the treasury would borrow \$1,500,000,000 from the public next week in the largest single cash borrowing operation since World War days.

The borrowing will top by \$200,000,000 the former record set only a few weeks ago.

While details of the borrowing will not be determined until after a conference between treasury and federal reserve officials next Tuesday, the borrowing will boost the federal debt to more than \$56,000,000,000, or within \$9,000,000,000 of the debt limit.

Finns Thrown Back by Reds

MOSCOW, Nov. 27-(AP)—The Moscow radio Thursday quoted a Red Star correspondent on the Finnish front as reporting that furious Finnish attacks had been repulsed south and west of Medvezhegorsk, and that Soviet forces were advancing in the Kestenga area, inflicting heavy losses on Germans and Finns.

Medvezhegorsk is on the Leningrad-Murmansk railway at the northwest tip of Lake Onega. Kestenga, farther north, is 35 miles east of the 16th Finnish border and 210 miles south of Murmansk.

Legion Backs Bills WASHINGTON, Nov. 27-(AP)—The American Legion and several other veterans organizations Thursday supported two bills to broaden the World War pension program, but another witness said they would entail enormous expenditures for "training camp heroes who never smelled gunpowder."

Indo-China had assured that Japan had no aggressive intentions toward Thailand.

LONDON, Nov. 28 (Friday) —(AP)—Authoritative sources said today they had no knowledge to substantiate a report that Britain and the United States had guaranteed to protect Thailand against aggression.

HONOLULU, Nov. 27-(AP)—The army's Hawaiian department went on the alert Thursday, with soldiers guarding public buildings and bridges of this major military base.

Soldiers doing guard duty turned out in field equipment, including steel helmets and bayonets.

The alert was much like others of the series held for training purposes, but never before with the international situation in the Pacific at such an acute stage.

MANILA, Nov. 27-(AP)—Tight military control of all activities in this far eastern outpost, perhaps even a military governorship, was believed imminent by reliable sources Thursday night as they surveyed possibilities from all-day conferences between the "big four" military and civil chiefs of the Philippines.

The conferences were officially characterized as being "entirely co-incidental" with developments at Washington, where the Japanese-American negotiations are under way. Informed observers, however, were inclined to believe they concerned military matters, including civilian defense.

NEW YORK, Nov. 28-(Friday)—(AP)—Six more shipments of Japanese troops and equipment arrived early today at Hainan and Hue, French Indo-China, said a Vichy radio broadcast heard by NBC.

"All civilian traffic in these ports has been suspended by the Japanese police," the broadcast added, quoting reports from Saigon.

SHANGHAI, Nov. 28-(Friday)—(AP)—The fourth US marines ended a 14-day stay in Shanghai today amid a tearful send-off which extended the entire three-mile route of their march from barracks through main streets of the international settlement to the customs jetty.

There they boarded tenders and went out to the liner President Harrison, which was scheduled to sail this afternoon.

The first group of the marines left Wednesday aboard the President Madison.

Train Crashes Fatal to One; 24 Injured

HORTENSE, Ga., Nov. 27-(AP)—One man was killed and at least 24 persons were injured Thursday when two New York-to-Florida passenger trains of the Atlantic Coast line were derailed in separate accidents that occurred within the same hour, one near here and the other at Dover, Fla.

Crushed to death as seven cars of the streamlined Tamiami Champion overturned south of Hortense was a middle-aged man tentatively identified as John Carroll of Cleveland, Ohio.

About 300 miles away, on Florida's west coast, the Havana Special was derailed shortly before 6 a.m., just after leaving Dover, 10 miles from Tampa. Eight persons were injured but only two required hospitalization.

The entire seven-car train left the rails but only three cars overturned.

In neither wreck was there any evidence of sabotage. E. B. Rush, superintendent of transportation in the railroad's southern division offices, said at Jacksonville, Fla.

PORTLAND, Nov. 27-(AP)—Use of Bonneville power in state institutions might save the state \$35,000 annually, Paul J. Raver, Bonneville administrator, told Ormond R. Bean, state public utilities commissioner, Thursday.

Bean was in conference with Raver and Portland General Electric company officials. He said he wanted to know where, how, on what basis and at what rates Bonneville could serve state buildings.

He added that he lacked authority to make any commitments, but that he sought the information for the governor and the state board of control.
