# Awards Made At Program

#### 4H Winners Told At Event Sponsored By Dallas Chamber

DALLAS - Last Friday four county 4H club members received \*awards at the annual Polk county achievement day program as the four most outstanding club members in four divisions of 4H club work. In addition one of them received the coveted county agent trophy as the most outstanding 4H club member in the county among all divisions.

Evelyn Wells, Rickreall, was judged the outstanding 4H club member in the county during the past year based on her outstanding success in sheep club work. Evelyn whose address has been Rickreall until recently, when she moved with her family to Yamhill county, was the highest scoring Hampshire sheep club member at the state fair and was awarded a pursebred lamb by the famous Foothills Farms at Carlton.

At the Pacific International she exhibited the grand champion lamb which sold for the record price of \$3.50 per pound, a dollar higher than any such previous sale. In addition to winning the county agent's trophy she was awarded the Dallas chamber of commerce trophy for sheep club member.

Bringing additional glory to the Wells family, Maurine, a sister of Evelyn, received the cup for being the outstanding girl in cooking club work in the county Maurine's winnings at the county and state fairs placed her at the head of this division.

The Wells family has been an outstanding family in club work for the past couple of years and this year in particular. H. A. Wells, father of the two girls mentioned above and also of Eddie Wells, and outstanding dairy club member, has been a club leader in this county. Mrs. Wells has aided in the 4H club program and she, together with Mr. Wells and the two girls, were guests of the Dallas chamber of commerce at the regular noon luncheon where these awards were made.

Ruth Farmer, Oak Grove, received for the third time the cup warded to the girl most outstanding in sewing club work. This third winning gives her permanent possession of this trophy.

Another cup went into permanent possession, this one being for dairy club work, which was awarded to Lyle Knower for the third time. This makes the second cup Lyle has won. However, it will be his last in this competition due to the fact that the age limit will prevent him from making further such winnings in the county.

Both Lyle and Ruth were accompanied by their parents who were also guests of the Dallas chamber of commerce at the noon luncheon.

About 450 club members, leaders and parents met for the afternoon part of the achievement day program, all of which is sponsored by the Dallas chamber of commerce.

Bill Blackley, secretary of the Dallas chamber of commerce, on behalf of Phillip Hayter, president, welcomed the group to Dallas and explained the interest of the chamber of commerce in 4H club work.



#### **Forward Swing Lifts** Favorites; Average **Shows Big Gain**

NEW YORK, Dec. 11-(AP)-The stock market overrode world war declarations Thursday with a forward swing that lifted favorites 1 to more than 3 points.

Dealings and prices faltered after a fast get-away but bidding was resumed in the final hour. A little profit taking shaved extreme advances at the close but many leaders emerged at or near the day's top. The afternoon bulge came in the wake of the war vote in congress against the axis

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks ended with a net gain upturn after three declining sessions. Transfers amounted to 1,-400,890 shares compared with 2,- Portland Livestock 088,320 the day before. It was the first day this week in which the turnover fell under the 2,000,000

American Telephone dipped to a new 1941 bottom, then turned around and ran up briskly and ended with a net gain of 3 points. Other prominent climbers included US Steel, Bethlehem, Youngstown Sheet, Anaconda, Kennecott, Phelps Dodge, Eastman Kodak, Boeing, Douglas Aircraft, Dow Chemical, Westinghouse, Texas Co., and J. I. Case. General Motors was under water, along with Montgomery Ward and Patino Mines. Rubbers and utilities were narrow.


