

Siren Signal For Blackout

Violators Noted in Early Risers; Fine Question Studied

SCIO—Four blasts of the city fire siren will be the blackout and air raid warning signal in Scio, it was agreed by the local ARP committee headed by E. J. Holland.

Residents have cooperated during night hours, Holland reports, but numerous violations were noted among early risers turning on lights before the blackout ends at complete daylight.

Most Scioans have contented themselves with rising later, until light leaks and reflections can be completely darkened.

A special meeting of the city council was called Thursday night to determine fines to be imposed upon blackout violators.

Tuesday night at 8 pm at Scio VFW hall the initial meeting of first aid course, under sponsorship of the Linn county Red Cross and the county defense council, will be held.

W. P. Goulding, Scio osteopath, will instruct the free course. Three-year first aid certificates given to members who completed the last previous course conducted in Scio have expired and a number of these persons have expressed intention to repeat the course.

Scio and the immediate vicinity contributed \$92, the largest sum ever donated here to the annual Red Cross roll call, Mrs. V. J. Philipp, local solicitor for the Linn county chapter, reports.

Plans to survey the entire holdings of the Roaring River Lumber company, subsidiary of the Crossett and Western interests, were under way in timber southeast of Scio this week by Earl Davis, surveyor for the Crown Willamette Paper company.

The Roaring river company has begun road construction work from the holdings in the Bilyeu Den section south over the mountain to Roaring river, a distance of seven miles.

About 100 men are expected to be employed in road and timber work in that area by next spring, with at least seven years' logging contemplated.
