Stock Market **Stages Rally**

Best Session in More Than Year Results In General Rise

NEW YORK, Dec. 30-(AP)-Stocks hit the high spots in Tuesday's market for the best rally in more than a year,

After some irregularity at the opening, when it was necessary to absorb continued heavy tax sellfing, a buying wave swept over the list and lifted favorites 1 to 4 points at the best. A few isolated strong spots such as American Telephone were up around 9. The prices slipped in many cases at the close but the majority still were well out in front when the final gong sounded.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks ended with a net advance of 1.4 points at 37.2, biggest jump of this barometer since November 7, 1940. Dealings were exceptionally speedy at intervals but slowdowns occurred after mid-day. Transfers, however, of 2,558,507 shares were second to Monday's turnover of 2,925,455 shares which were the largest since May 21 last year.

The major telephone stock was far and away the day's sensation. At its top it was up around 9 points from its Monday's final quotation and some 15 points from its low of last week. "Shorts" were run in, brokers said, when it was discovered the issue had been "sold to a standstill" and was extremely difficult to repurchase. It emerged with a net advance of 5% points at 1271/2.

Shares up 3 to 4 or so included Union Carbide, Allied Chemical, Du Pont, Westinghouse, American Can, and Union Pacific.

Among lesser gainers were U S. Steel, Bethlehem, Chrysler, General Motors, U. S. Rubber preferred, Sears Roebuck, International Harvester, Santa Fe, Southern Pacific, Great Northern, Standard Oil (NJ), Texas Co. Anaconda, American Smelting Douglas Aircraft, Sperry, Western Union and U. S. Gypsum.

Credit Dealers **Must Register** By Month End

In accordance with the prosions of regulation W, pertaini to consumer credit, many deal and lenders engaged in extendi installment credit have filed re istration statements with federal reserve bank of S Francisco.

The number of statements ceived to date makes it appare however, that numerous concer which are required to register December 31, if they plan continue to extend installm credit, have thus far overlook filing the statement.

It is urged that any dealer w sells listed consumers' dura goods on the installment p and any cash lender who exte installment credit in amounts \$1500 or less, file the necessary registration statement at once, unless that has already been done.

Necessary forms and instructions for registering can be obtained from the federal reserve bank, San Francisco, or any of its branches, located in Los An-geles, Portland, Salt Lake City and Seattle. If any concern is in doubt as to whether it should register, it should communicate at once with the nearest office of the federal reserve bank,
