Gas Use Up—Gasoline consumption in Oregon during the first 11 months of 1941 aggregated 274,770,525 gallons which is equivalent to 3,143,374,806 miles of travel, the secretary of state reported here Wednesday. The consumption this year was 13.7 per cent over the gallonage used during the corresponding period a year ago. Total tax paid on gasoline used so far this year is \$13,738,526.58, compared with \$12,042,154.65 for the same period in 1940.

Salem Chamber Making Survey For US Camp

Because of the possible immediate construction of the army cantonment between Monmouth and Corvallis, the chamber of commerce here is conducting a survey to obtain an estimate of the number of vacant houses, rooms, and apartments, as well as accommodations that can be offered by hotels and auto camps for army engineers, officers and men who would be employed on the project.

Any residents having vacant rooms, apartments or houses are asked to get in touch with the chamber of commerce offices. Names and addresses of persons having vacancies will be taken and cards will be sent to be filled out with information such as number of rooms, furnished or unfurnished, and whether they have basements, furnaces and garages.

Capital Business College Receives Government Call For Stenographers

Word received this week from the Civil Service Commission, Washington, D.C., by the Capital Business College of Salem, is of impelling interest. The following is quoted from the bulletin issued December 22, 1941:

"The government needs stenographers for National defense. One is prone to think of National Defense in terms of soldiers, sailors and marines. But there are many types of defense work behind the lines. A large army of civilian personnel is now on duty as stenographers in the Government service to take the dictation of the thousands of executives and administrative officers, and transcribe it into typewritten documents. Some of this material is of lasting importance. Some of it will set into motion Government events of historical consequence.

"It is estimated that the Government has approximately 85,000 stenographers, typists and secretaries on the payroll. Many young men and women are responding to the call. Thousands more are needed.

"Aside from the present emergency, the opportunities for stenographers in the Government service are favorable. Good stenographers are always in demand. The positions pay \$1,440 a year to start, with a good chance for advancement to positions of greater

"To provide more living quarters for Government employees, especially for those in the lower-income groups, there has been begun, under Government sponsorship, a building program for constructing thousands of apartments, dormitories, and homes in Washington, D.C."

Not more than 20 employees of the state employment service will be transferred from Salem to Portland because of federalization of the state employment activities, officials announced here Wednesday.

These employees are in the training, research and accounting divisions. There are approximately 250 state employment service employees in Oregon. Headquarters, under the federalization program, will be in Portland, with L. C. Stoll, director, in charge.
