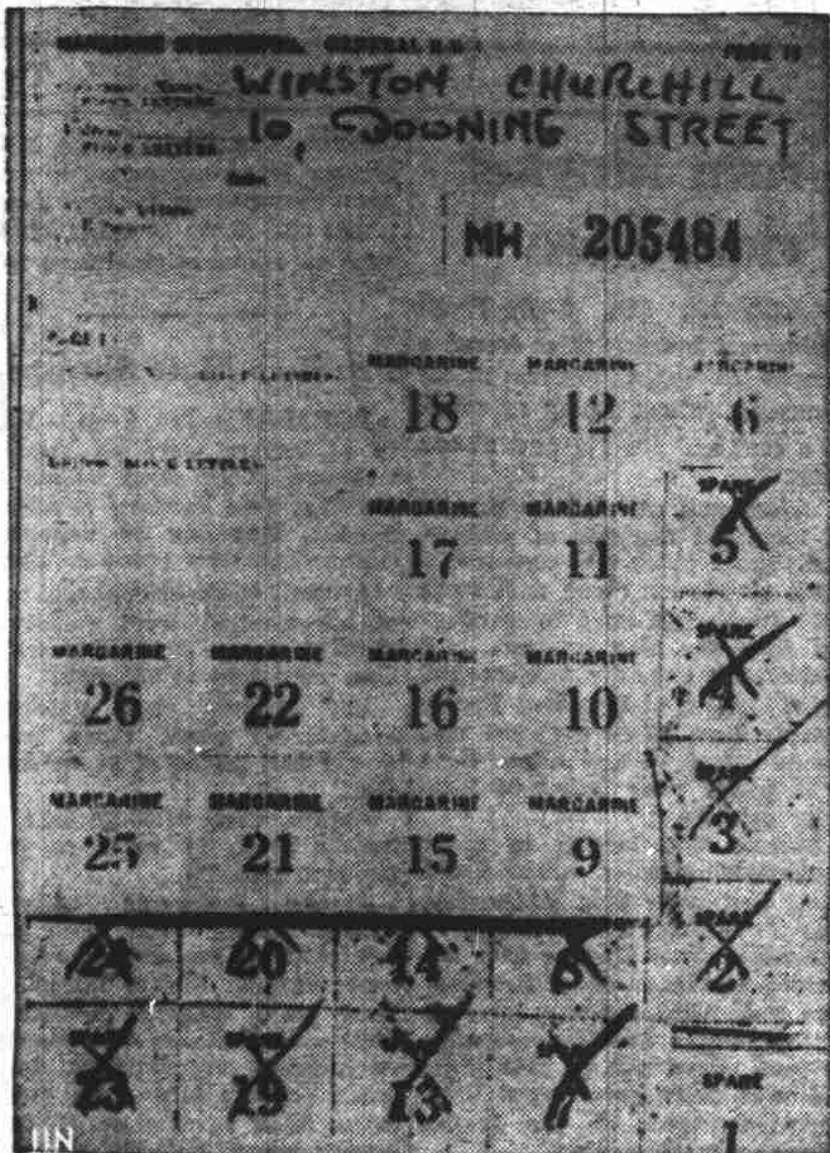


Here's Churchill's Ration Card

Even Prime Minister Winston Churchill uses a ration booklet in England these war days. Above is pictured the spare margins page in Churchill's food rationing booklet. It was used as a clothes ration card until special clothes cards were issued. Churchill has used 13 of his coupons, representing four pairs of socks and two handkerchiefs. With those left on this page and those on his new clothing ration card he has enough to buy a complete suit and a shirt.

Valley Schools Close; Power Cut Off, Property Damage Noted

SILVERTON—Silverton was without much modern service Wednesday night and Thursday morning with telephone and electric wires both stretched on the ground, snapped completely off, in much of the district.

Huge trees were completely broken off. Telegraphic messages supposed to reach Silverton Wednesday failed to arrive until late Wednesday afternoon and from then on no messages arrived.

Portland papers failed to reach rural districts Tuesday night and Wednesday morning but made it through late on Wednesday night and Thursday morning.

MT. ANGEL — St. Mary's grammar school held classes Wednesday but closed at 3:30 p.m. There was no school on Thursday.

Only about 40 students reported for classes at Mt. Angel college Wednesday morning and school was dismissed about 9:30 a.m.

Telephone wires were out of order, the power was off for short periods, trees were down, and cars were stranded here and there.

WEST SALEM—The local schools were closed Thursday and there will be no school today.

AURORA—The Aurora grade school and the Canby Union high will be closed indefinitely.

Business in Aurora is at a standstill as traffic is almost impossible.

AUMSVILLE—School closed Wednesday because of lack of electric power. Buses were called off and children told to remain at home.

TALBOT—Power and telephone lines are out and schools are closed indefinitely.

Fruit trees, shade trees and shrubs are being damaged to a great extent. All traffic except a few trucks that have chains are tied up.
