Former Salem Man Returned to Church Services in Salem

Face Forged Check Charges; Driver Fined by McMahan

Accused of having passed a forged check to a Salem grocer, Garnet G. Thompson, who was returned to Salem late Thursday in custody of Sheriff A. C. Burk from Seattle, waived preliminary hearing Friday in Salem justice court and was bound over to the grand jury. In lieu of \$1000 bail he was committed to the county jail.

Frank Kluck, appearing before Judge L. H. McMahan Friday on appeal from justice court, changed his plea from innocent to guilty and was sentenced to pay a \$15 fine for reckless driving.
