Dr. Gordon Will Speak Saturday

The social and political set-up of China under Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek is to be discussed by Dr. Erna Gordon before Salem branch, American Association of University Women, Saturday afternoon at the branch's regular monthly luncheon session.

"China, Our Ally" is the subject Dr. Gordon has chosen for her address at the meeting scheduled for 1 o'clock at the Marion hotel, Mrs. Chester Luther, branch program chairman, announced Saturday.

State representative for United China relief and in that position responsible for the county organizations sponsoring the nationwide campaign within Oregon, Dr. Gordon is widely known among university women of the Willamette valley. They recall her return from Germany in 1939, where during her years of student life she had watched the growth of nazism, and they have observed her growing affiliation with groups interested in the study of international relations as they may affect American democracy.

Not only is Dr. Gordon state chairman of international relations for AAUW, she holds a similar post with the Oregon Federation of Women's clubs and with the Portland federation. She is said to be the youngest woman ever to have filled either of the state posts.
