



U. S. army air corps fiyers, members of the American Volunteer Group aiding in the protection of the U. S. army air corps fiyers, members of the American Volunteer Group aiding in the protection of the Burma road and the important Burma capital city, Rangoon, are covering themselves with glory as they join with British airmen in destroying Japanese air raiders. Rangoon is a city of 400,000 population. Japanese artillery based in abandoned Moulmein has been shelling Martaban in an effort to make it untenable for British imperial troops. Jap barges along the lower Salween river were hit by U. S. and British fiyers. American volunteer flyers protecting the vital Burma road, lifeline for China to its capital, Chungking, are headed by Brig. Gen. Claire L. Chennault, well-known in U. S. aviation circles as the leader of the famous air corps' "three men on a flying trapeze" which has thrilled U. S. air show audiences in the past.
