He was supported by E. H. Wiegand, Oregon State college, who reported that the state's 1000 dryers had shrunk to less than 400 in a suitable condition. These dryers, he said, were sufficient to handle only half of a normal crop.

Marketing agreements have not yet been popular with Oregon prune growers because of a "suspicion of any tie-up with our southern neighbors," the growers said.


