Evacuation of Civilians is Topic Here

Plans for the evacuation of civilians from this area provided such action is required, were discussed at a meeting of state and evacuation committee officials here Thursday.

George Levison, regional coordinator of evacuation for the ninth corps area and Pearce Davies, director of defense of the health and welfare division of the federal security agency, attended the session.

State officials present included Gov. Charles A. Sprague, Charles P. Pray, superintendent of state police; R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, and Jerrold Owen, state civilian defense coordinator.

Ross McIntyre, Portland, chairman of the state evacuation committee, presided.

Officials said evacuation plans were progressing satisfactorily.
