At a pre-organization meeting of a Salem unit of the Oregon roadside council held Thursday at the Golden Pheasant, Mrs. A. E. Rockey, honorary president, and Mrs. Jessie M. Honeyman, Portland, president of the state council, discussed objectives of the organization in connection with defense. Miss Elizabeth Lord, temporary local president, presided at the informal meeting.

Objectives of the Oregon Roadside defense council, said Mrs. Honeyman, are fourfold:

1. To assist in keeping Oregon scenery intact, during necessary military construction.
2. Protect forests against fire and sabotage.
3. Assist in collecting salvage and at the same time clean up unsightly auto dumps.
4. Protect the scenery of the Columbia gorge in spite of new defense uses.

Junior fire wardens are being enlisted in all public schools, explained Mrs. Honeyman, to assist in preserving the forests against the danger of summer fires and sabotage. Plans are being formulated to keep the beauty of the highways even through the construction of the cantonment.
