

Stock Market Wisly-Washy

Bad Week Puts Issues Close to Lowest Mark In Nearly Four Years

NEW YORK, March 14 (AP)—Stocks emerged from another bad week: Saturday with trends indecisive.

Recoveries were well sprinkled over the list at the start of the brief session but steels, motors and rails inclined to lag. Plus and minus signs of fractions were pretty well divided at the close.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was off .1 of a point at 34.4 where it was only .1 above the lowest mark in nearly four years. On the week the composite showed a net decline of .8 selling pressure never was in evidence and transfers totaled only 284,640 shares, second smallest two-hour turnover since last August. The aggregate a week ago amounted to 271,980 shares.

The day's even-Steven performance was exemplified by the fact that, of 502 individual issues traded, 175 were down, 153 up and 174 unchanged.

In the new low class were such stocks as American Airlines, Texas Co., Chesapeake & Ohio, Allied Chemical and American Can.

On the upside were American Telephone, Phelps Dodge, Standard Oil (NJ), Pepsi-Cola, U. S. Rubber, United Aircraft and J. C. Penney.

Grain Market Prices Slump

CHICAGO, March 14 (AP)—Grain prices drifted downward Saturday, wheat losing about a cent, rye almost 2 cents and other cereals lesser amounts.

Failure of flour and milling trade buying to appear in anything like volume some traders had expected prior to temporary withdrawal, after Saturday, of government offers of milling wheat was a bearish factor.

Trade languished because of uncertainty as to the final form in which congress will pass legislation restricting government sales of wheat and corn and the president's action on the matter. Some selling was blamed on a belief that it will be vetoed.
