Thought Robbery Solved—Arrest of Theodore William Lafar on a drunken driving charge in Martinez, Calif., may have provided a solution to the robbery of the Roy Houck Construction company temporary Scappoose offices earlier this year, deputies in the office of Sheriff A. C. Burk believe. John A. Miller, sheriff in the California county, has notified Burk's office that Lafar when arrested had in his car a check writer, check protectors, approximately \$100 worth of tools and 43 checks on the construction company together with a book of approximately 100 check stubs. Articles similar to those described were taken from the Scappoose job two months ago, and state police have been working in conjunction with the Columbia county sheriff's office in attempting to trace the theft. A number of checks, presumably represented by the stubs in Lafar's possession, have come back to him, Houck said.

Damage Trial Continues Today In Circuit Court; Grand Jury Brings Indictment Against Lyon

Extension of a damage action trial over into today's session of circuit court necessitated postponement Thursday of the scheduled jury hearing of the case of City of Salem against Walter John Borcher, charged with drunken driving. No new trial date for the appealed case from municipal court was set.

The damage action, Edna Smith vs. E. C. Alford, will continue at 8:15 a.m. with defense testimony in progress. It is expected to reach the jury today.

State troopers arrested 37 persons for drunken driving during February last, Charles P. Pray, superintendent of the state police department, reported to Gov. Charles A. Sprague Thursday.

There were 1012 arrests in the motor vehicle law activities division during the month. Fines aggregated \$8092.45. Arrests in the general law enforcement division numbered 184 with fines of \$828.95, 52 in the game code division and seven in the commercial fisheries code division.
