LEBANON — Mrs. George Harder and Ruth Enders have received word that their brother-in-law, Rev. Robert Christman, who has been a missionary in Thailand for a number of years, has been interned somewhere out of Bangkok, now in Japanese hands. Their sister, with her two small children were evacuated some months ago and is now in Glendale, Calif.

Another sister, Claire Enders, a graduate of the Methodist hospital in Los Angeles, is now a Lieutenant in the army nurse corps and reported for active duty at Camp Roberts this week. She is a member of an evacuation unit organized at the Good Samaritan hospital in Los Angeles, where she has been working. After six weeks of intensive training at Camp Roberts, the unit will be sent wherever evacuees need care.
