Cutting a path of death and destruction through a section of Lacon, Ill., a fierce tornado was a tricky twister, too. Here one side of a house was blown into splinters and a felled tree poked branches through broken windows. Twenty persons were dead in Illinois in the wake of the storm, and property damage in Lacon alone was estimated at about \$400,000.
