Pre-School Clinic Slated at West Salem School in April

WEST SALEM—Margaret Gillis, Polk county health nurse, announced Wednesday that a pre-school clinic will be held at the local school during the first part of April. All children from nine months to school age will be given medical and dental examinations, and children from four to six years of age will be immunized for a small charge.

Due to war conditions health officials are particularly anxious to immunize children of the pre-school age. They are asking people of the city to notify friends and neighbors of this clinic.

Miss Gillis stated that the Schick test for diphtheria would not be given this month as has been previously reported. County health officials announced that too much expense would be involved to give the Schick test to all school children in the county.

Many parents called at the school Wednesday to consult the nurse in regard to the health of their children.

Women who have registered for the home nursing class met at the city hall Tuesday. A room will be equipped at the city hall for demonstration purposes and will be patterned after a hospital room. All people who have volunteered or been solicited for equipment will be notified through the press when to bring the articles to the city hall.

A definite time was not set for the classes, but will be decided by the instructor, Mrs. E. Wendt. An additional instructor may be secured so that two classes may be organized as 35 have already registered.

Primary Unnecessary Under Terms of New City Charter

SILVERTON—No primary election will be held at Silverton this May, according to Rex Albright, city attorney. Albright reported Thursday that he had just received an opinion on the new charter, which came into effect here following the last primary election at Silverton.

This charter now provides that Silverton's city officials to be elected, which will be four councilmen, will be nominated by petition and placed only on the November balloting sheet.

At Coote, R. A. Fish, L. F. Tucker and Lowell Brown are the retiring councilmen. Reber Allen, who is now mayor, John W. Jordan and Ernest Starr are hold-overs.

The mayor is elected from the seven councilmen by their votes following their installation. The

city attorney, now Rex Albright, is appointed by the city manager and council and the city manager himself is chosen by the council.
