# Most Stocks Slow Tuesday

#### Airline Issues Fare Well; Buying Is Reluctant

NEW YORK, April 7-(AP)-While airlines and other specialties gave a fairly good account of themselves in Tuesday's stock market, many leaders failed to extend Monday's recovery bulge.

Buying reluctance for most pivotals was in evidence at the opening and, in relatively slow dealings, irregular tendencies persisted to the close.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was off .1 of a point at 34.9. Transfers totaled 308,320 shares against 335,200 Monday.

Action of the civil aeronautics board in granting Continental Air Lines a mail rate boost and agreeing to reconsider the American Airlines rate cut case aided stocks in this division. Both American and Eastern Airlines pushed up a point each.

A New Jersey court decision in favor of a stockholder of American Car & Foundry preferred who demanded increased dividends on the senior issue lifted Quotations at Portland this stock 2% in the late proceedings while the common, which ap- Produce Exchange parently was barred from an im-

parently was barred from an immediate dividend by the court ruling, fell 13%.

Led by corn and oats, which responded to continued gains in the hog market, where prices reached new peaks for the past 16 years, the cereal market showed signs of advancing at times. Corn rose as much as 1/2 cent and oats % cent, pulling wheat and rye out of an early decline of about 1/2 cent. The bread cereals registered gains of about 1/2 cent at one stage.

Chief counsel for the house naval affairs committee, which is investigating war production as part of current hearings on the Smith bill, Edmund H. Toland. above, reports that a survey of 15 companies handling naval contracts had shown salaries and bonuses of their officials in 1941 ranged from 22 to 1,331 per cent above that of 1934. The Smith bill would outlaw the closed shop for the duration, limit war profits to 6 per cent and suspend the 40hour work week. The treasury opposes the 6 per cent proposal and both President Roosevelt and War Production Chief Donald Nelson oppose suspension of the 40-hour work week.


