"We inflicted more damage than we received," Admiral Glassford said. The battle began when the Al-tied fleet challenged a Japanese force convoying 45 transports off the Java coast, The Allies enemy. Admiral Glassford, a native San Franciscan, expects to be "back in Java very soon and in Manila with MacArthur." He deplored America weak-
