### Cochran Foresees Good Highway To Aid Cantonment Problems

"The Independence road is bound to come and the bridge will be no narrow bottleneck but part of a four-lane highway!" Clay Cochran, new business and promotion manager of the Salem chamber of commerce, predicted Friday to Salem Realty board and retail trade committee as they met in joint luncheon session.

Key to practically all benefits which may be received by Salem from Camp Adair, he declared is the matter of satisfactory transportation. Inexpensive bus service, he pointed out, is not only a requirement for securing federal recognition as a defense area for housing purposes but also to save private cars and keep the highways open to general traffic.

Cervalla hotel and apartment rates have mounted heavily since start of work at the cantonment, he declared, pointing out that thousands of workmen living to be employed must find living places in this area for themselves and in some cases for families. Friendliness, he maintained, will well repay residents of the capital city.

To his request that the realty board take over the housing problem, the organization responded with an assignment to its housing committee to undertake the listing and dissemination of that information as it may determine.

Members of the committee, which met following the luncheon and has declared it will have its first announcement of plans sometime next week, are Mrs. Winnie Pettijohn, chairman, F. H. Weir, vice chairman, N. J. Lindgren, J. D. Sears and George Alderlin.
