Thurlough De Forest and family have moved to Taft where he is now employed.

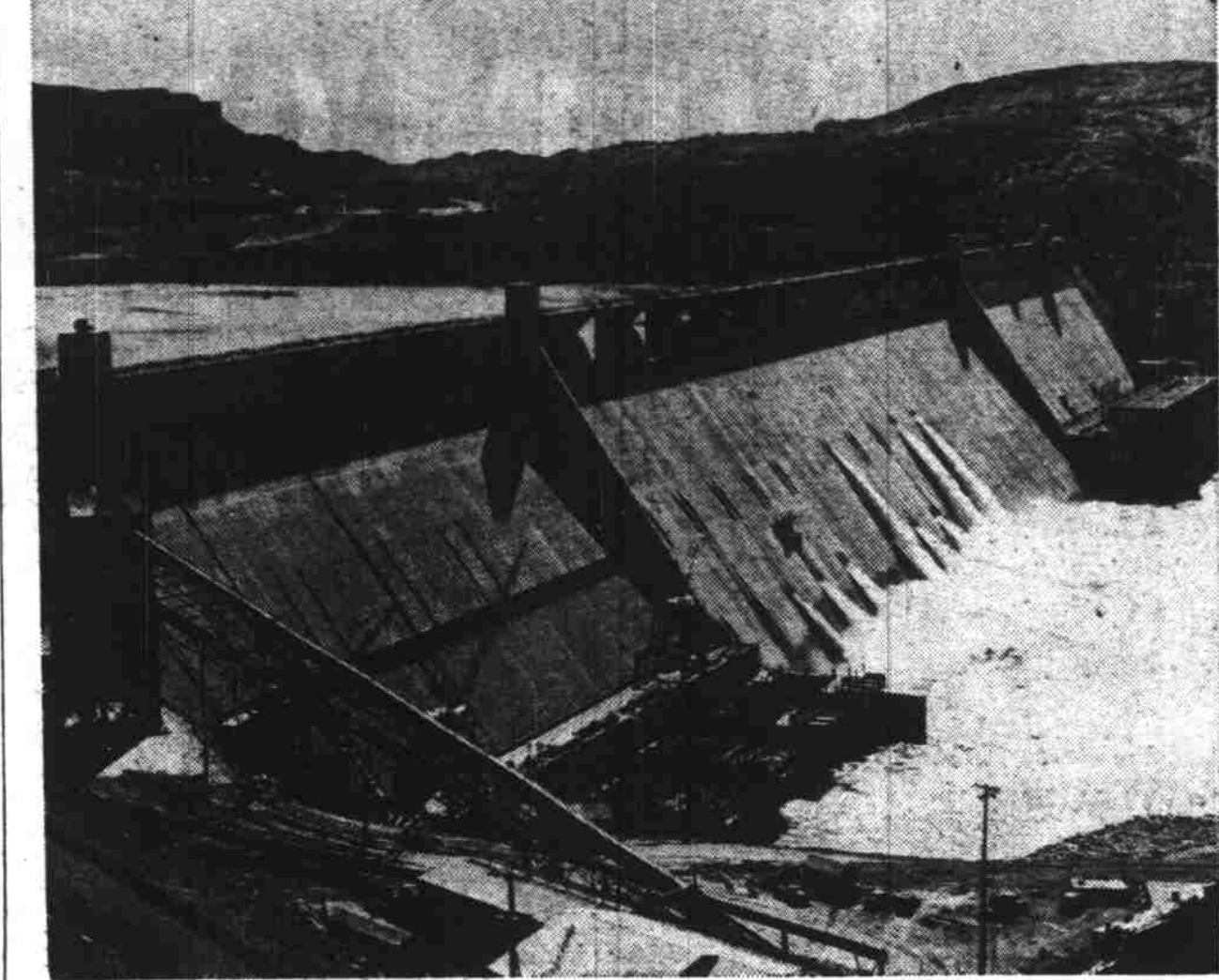

Curtain of Water to Sheathe Coulee Dam by Summer



A gigantic curtain of water will plunge over the crest of Washington's Grand Coulee dam early this summer to hide the section of concrete between the partially completed east powerhouse on this side the river, and the completed building on the opposite shore. The forthcoming spectacle is expected to draw thousands to the project. The new powerhouse is being rushed to completion to meet an ever-increasing demand for more energy for war industries. Although, when completed, it will be one of the largest concrete buildings on the Pacific coast, the structure appears small against the vast expanse of concrete.

3117 Ration Books Issued At Silverton

SILVERTON — Silverton's rationing board headquarters has been a busy place this week with sugar returns coming in from the various outlying school districts. Reports Wednesday showed 4284 registered and 3117 books issued in the Silverton district, which includes outlying school districts as well. It was expected that registration will continue through Friday if necessary. Forty women had registered 2147 and issued 1682 books in school district No. 4, during the first two days. Walter Geren, clerk of the local rationing board, reports there seems to be some misunderstanding in regard to canning sugar. Persons have been appearing at the defense headquarters in hopes of registering for this additional sugar now. As yet, Mr. Geren reports, no provision for this has been made and no information received by the local board as to when such provision will be made.
