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City Appeals From Decree

The city of Salem by City Attorney Lawrence N. Brown filed notice of appeal in circuit court here Tuesday from a decree of April 27 which held \$27,517.05 in 1936 taxes a lien against the city water department's properties and the city liable for payment.

Appeal bond was signed by Brown for the city and Lottie D. Winslow as surety.

The city contends the tax, if due at all, was a lien for which the private water company from which the city bought the system was liable.

The commission said title to the other six buildings would be retained so they may be used for easing the housing shortage.
