Mill City Pupils Buy War Stamps

MILL CITY — Vernon S. Todd, Mill City grade school principal, reports the following defense stamp purchases by the various grades and the percentage of pupils in each grade who are saving stamps: First grade, \$36 in stamps and every child in the room owning a book; second grade, \$47 and also 100 per cent; third grade, \$51 and 77 per cent of class owning stamps; fourth grade, \$17—73 per cent owning; fifth grade, \$41—83 per cent owning; sixth grade, \$39—77 per cent; seventh grade, \$75—70 per cent owning; eighth grade, \$46—70 per cent owning. For the entire school there is a total of \$352.90 with an 84 per cent average.

In practically every case, especially in the lower grades, the stamps have been purchased with money the youngsters have earned. There are also bonds amounting to \$505.65, but these have been gifts in most of the cases, whereas the stamps are being bought by the individuals themselves.
