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

Dallas Man Will Start Within Few Days on Potatoes

DALLAS - A vegetable dehydrating plant is being planned by J. C. Tracy, local prune packing man. Mr. Tracy has leased the George Minty prune dehydrator and is changing it to do the vegetable drying. It is possible that the dehydrating program may develop into an extensive industry in Dallas, at least during the war

Mr. Tracy plans to start within few days to work on potatoes. He has a government order and fen, cantonment worker; C. J. potatoes, mostly from the Klamath region. The potatoes will be peeled by machine, eyes removed, and diced. Then they are steam cooked, riced, and sent through the dryer tunnels on trays. The

beans, carrots, cabbage and onions. forth each day. The dryer is to be freed for prunes during prune drying season.
