NEW YORK, May 28-(AP) Enough profits were cashed on Wednesday's brisk rally to stem the rising tide in Thursday's stock market.

Steels and motors, buoyant performers of the day before, were in difficulties. While an assortment of favorites managed to emerge on the advancing side, closing declines were well distributed.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was unchanged to 34.6. Dealings tapered off as trends became indecisive. Transfers of 353,900 shares compared with 433,830 Wednesday.
